Dear Colonel Akin:

The delay in reporting on the various matters you asked me to look into has been occasioned by the fact that I was ordered up to Momouth on the machine affairs and lost about a week from the office. Then when I returned things had piled up. But now I can get this off and will try to cover every item.

Among the several matters I was to look into for you was the one concerning international agreements covering the use of radio frequencies in your area. I discussed this with Col. Crawford, telling him that our stations had been encountering interference from certain broadcasting stations there and that you wanted to know what could be done toward straightening out a somewhat difficult situation due to the increasing use of radio in that area.

His reply was that if you will notify the Chief Signal Officer of each and every case of interference or infraction of international regulations, giving the date, hour, assigned frequency and approximate operating frequency, he can take the matter up directly with the State Department for correction. This is a quite usual procedure. If you don't know or can't determine the assigned frequency, at least the approximate operating frequency should be furnished.

I hope this is along the lines of what you wanted me to convey in that matter.

Now as regards the information you wanted as to commercial communication facilities along the air routes from our east and west coasts to the Canal Zone, Colonel Crawford is going to get that for you and will send it directly to you. He said, however, that he hesitates to ask for the same data for air routes further south, because it would mean a good deal of work on the part of the people who would have to gather it - unless you have real need for the data now, in which case please let me know.

As to the Navy Communication chart No. 2180 C, I have obtained two copies and have forwarded same under separate mailing tube.

You have no doubt by this time received a letter from The Adjutant General regarding the effective date of the new radio-telegraph and radiotelephone procedure. Apparently our radios got thee to see the matter in the proper light and they recognized the necessity for clarification. The letter followed as a result.

With regard to furnishing you with Cipher Devices Type W-138 and war reserve alphabet sets for emergency intra-department secret communication in case wire communication goes out, the feeling here is that it would be better to have the request initiated by the Department Commander. We have a few left but I doubt whether we could furnish 25 just now. Probably a dozen could be furnished without trouble. We are going ahead with plans for the production of a modified type and hope to get some by July or August, 1937.

I have communicated your idea regarding the desirability of making the transportation for the RI Detachment "special" in order to afford a good reason for withholding this transportation from the local pool.

In accordance with your request, I took up informally with Captain Back the matter of fencing in and fixing up the grounds around the Chiva Chiva and the Corozal radio stations. He considered the matter and then told me rather disappointing news. I asked him if he'd be good enough to write it up so I would not convey any misinformation to you and I enclose his remarks. Maybe there is some hope.

The small loose-leaf paper sheets you wanted me to get will be forwarded under separate cover in a day or so. I have not forgotten about same.

Another disappointing piece of news concerns the personnel situation for the RI detachment. You were to get a technical sergeant but a monkey wrench was thrown into the works as a result of a decision by the Chief of Staff making an immediate increase in special grades and ratings for the Air Corps. Consequently, no technical sergeancies can be furnished any of our RI detachments this fiscal year. Colonel Hinemon has hopes for next year and will certainly keep this in mind, he assures me. I hope this will not handicap you too severely, although I know the situation was bad enough before, without this additional loss.

The question of emergency methods of communication with Washington was raised by Dr. Sinkov. I find that according to our records there are in Panama already all necessary war reserve systems. Among this material is a pamphlet of instructions covering a system requiring nothing but pencil, paper and a keyword. Also, there is the Universal

Emergency Key with Cipher Device Type M-94. Will not the presence of this reserve material serve to answer the needs? If not, please let me have further details.

I talked with the Navy regarding a new Joint Aircraft Code and it seems that they are going to raise a question as to the real necessity for a separate joint code. They feel that perhaps this matter had best be reinvestigated in the light of the past three years experience before proceeding to draw up a new joint code.

The foregoing covers all the items you wished me to take up. If there are others or if you want additional notes on these, please write me.

In closing I want to thank you for the very flattering remarks contained in your official indorsement to the letter regarding my visit. I was much pleased. Also, I want to wish you all a Merry Christmas and a Happy New Year.

Boardman's construction shows a friction drive used in conjunction with a switching device for the sole purpose of permitting manual adjustment by means of a knurled nut (page 2, column 1, line 28 of Boardman patent). He does not provide a means for continuously and irregularly varying the relation between the elements of the friction drive components of his invention.

Furthermore, Boardman, in his construction shows a friction drive, manually adjustable, for the selection of a given number of circuits (as shown in figures 9 and 10 of Boardman) out of a plurality of circuits. He does not show at any place construction permitting the variation of the time interval between successive circuits of a plurality of circuits.

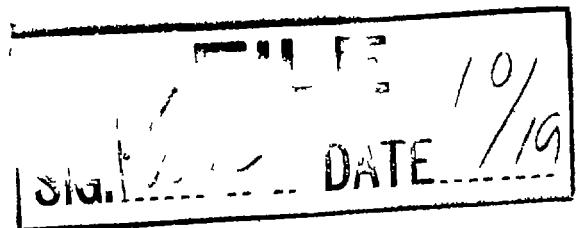

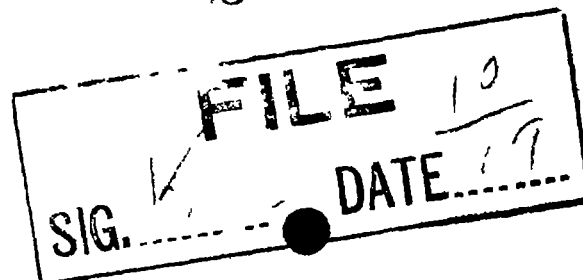



Dear Mr. Pancake:

Receipt is acknowledged of your letter dated October 4, 1937 relative to the participation of Lt. Col. William F. Friedman, Sig. Res., as a member of the United States delegation to the International Telephone and Telegraph Convention at Cairo in February, 1938.

I concur in your opinion that Lt. Col. Friedman is an outstanding man on the subject of code language and that his services at the convention would be very valuable. There is, however, a dominant factor at present which in my opinion far outweighs any possible usefulness at Cairo. The length of time he would be required to be absent from his duties here, coupled with the relatively small primary interest the Army might have in the proceedings in question, leads me to the conclusion that it would be inadvisable for the War Department to authorize Lt. Col. Friedman's attendance at the Cairo Conference even if requested by the State Department.

Attached is a tentative draft of a letter to Mr. Pancake.

When the possibility of Mr. Friedman's attendance at Cairo first came up I contacted Mr. DeWolf of the State Department, -- who handles this work, -- and was informed that a 25% cut in appropriations for Cairo limited the attendance of Army representatives to one man. Since there will be simultaneous conventions at Cairo on International Radio and International Telephone and Telegraph matters, it was agreed in this office that the latter should receive secondary consideration and that if Mr. Friedman should be authorized to attend it would be as a State Department or Department of Commerce representative, rather than Army.

Dear Sir:

On behalf of some 5,000 American business firms who make heavy use of international communications services, I am making a trip to the Cairo Convention of the International Telecommunications Union, as a member of the delegation of the International Chamber of Commerce. Because of the importance of questions on the agenda of this Conference, some of which suggest increase in rates for code messages as high as 16-2/3 per cent, I should like to see an American delegation with the best technical advice available participating. To this end I have addressed the Honorable Frank R. McNinch, the new Chairman of the Federal Communications Commission, and the Honorable Daniel C. Roper, Secretary of Commerce, suggesting that Col. William F. Friedman of your Department be given a place on the American delegation. In my opinion Col. Friedman is the foremost American authority on the subject of code language and has followed this particular subject from its introduction at the Paris Conference in 1925 up to the present time. I think it would be a distinct loss both to American business and the Government if he were not a member of the Cairo delegation.

I am addressing you with the hope that if his official duties permit, and an appointment is offered, he will be allowed to accept. Col. Friedman was Secretary to the American delegation at Brussels in 1928, and at Madrid in 1932. I attended both these conferences on behalf of American business, and it is with the knowledge of his ability so gained that I feel justified in making this request.

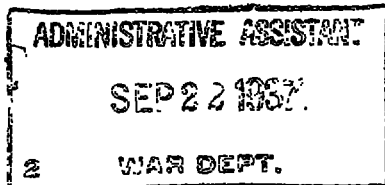

TO:

**Lt. Col. William F. Friedman, Sig-Res., 3932 Military Road,
Washington, D.C.**

1. Signal Reserve officers who are assigned to the Arm and Service Assignment Group may be ordered to active duty for 14 days' training each year in the numbers permitted by appropriations and at such places as training facilities are available. Normally, the officers of this group are given active duty training with the activity to which they are assigned for mobilization. When the time lost in travel would be too great or when a desirable type of training can be provided at some other station, effort will be made to arrange for active duty elsewhere.

2. In selecting the Signal Reserve officers to be ordered to active duty the Chief Signal Officer is governed by available funds and the following War Department directives:

a. "Except as authorized below, no Reserve officer who is drawing a pension, disability allowance, disability compensation or retired pay from the Government will be ordered to active duty under the War Department Appropriation Act. Reserve officers drawing pensions, retired pay, or annuities, for reasons other than physical disability may be ordered to active duty provided: (1) the officer is physically qualified for active duty; (2) the officer surrenders the right to such pension, retired pay or annuity for the period of active duty."

b. "Except during his first year of service, no Reserve officer who has failed to complete at least 25 hours of inactive duty during the preceding year will be detailed for 14-day active duty; nor will any Reserve officer, except Group I and Group II airplane pilots, be so detailed in more than two consecutive years except in special cases authorized by the Corps Area Commanders for officers of the Corps Area Assignment Group and by the Chiefs of Arms and Services for officers of the Arm and Service Assignment Group."

3. If you desire active duty training it is desired that you submit your application by letter as early as practicable and at least one (1) month prior to the date on which active duty would begin, in order that funds for your pay, allowances and mileage may be reserved. The attached application form may be used. It should be submitted in duplicate. Space is provided thereon to indicate your choice of periods for active duty training. Periods should be arranged so as to begin on Sunday. If desired, you may state a general period during which you can take training and thereby allow this office to select the exact dates of the 14-day period of training. If you desire active duty prior to June 30 of the present fiscal year it is requested that in this case you submit your application as soon as practicable. Preference will be given to those desiring active duty



prior to June 30 as a certain amount of funds is now available for this purpose.

4. Signal Reserve officers of the Arm and Service Assignment Group will, by virtue of their assignments, assume positions with considerable responsibility in event of a mobilization. The Chief Signal Officer urges that you endeavor to take active duty occasionally in order that you will be familiar with the duties and responsibilities that would immediately devolve upon you when ordered to active duty in such a case.

5. One of the requirements for promotion is that an officer has, during his service in grade, completed at least 14 days of active duty training and has received therefor an efficiency report of at least "satisfactory". Unless exempt because of qualification for reappointment by reason of civil occupation, 100 of the 200 hours of credits necessary for reappointment may be earned by serving one tour of 14 days active duty. The remaining 100 credit hours required for reappointment must be secured by inactive duty training. The facilities that are available to you to secure these inactive duty credits and the 25 hours of credits necessary in order to be ordered to active duty can be determined by inquiry of your local organized reserve headquarters or of this office. Army Regulations No. 140-5, dated June 16, 1936, and Army Regulations No. 140-38, dated July 22, 1936, are the regulations which cover all matters pertaining to the Signal Section of the Officers' Reserve Corps. These two regulations may be obtained for 15 cents from the Superintendent of Documents, Government Printing Office, Washington, D.C. These regulations are also on file at each organized reserve headquarters and you may inspect them there if you so desire. Information regarding Signal Reserve matters will be gladly furnished you at any time upon request to the Chief Signal Officer.

1. The records show that this Reserve officer has had seven (7) two-week tours of active duty training, with an average efficiency rating of "Excellent". During six of these tours of active duty he served as an instructor in codes and ciphers at The Signal Corps School, Fort Monmouth, New Jersey. He is employed as a cryptanalyst, Signal Service at Large, on duty in this office. He has also, in his civilian capacity as cryptanalyst, given lectures in codes and ciphers at The Signal Corps School, and served on the Signal Corps Board at Fort Monmouth, New Jersey on several occasions in connection with such subjects.

2. His last tour of active duty training was during the period September 14 - 27, 1930, inclusive. He has been given a low priority for active duty training in view of his position as cryptanalyst, Signal Service at Large, and in conformity with instructions from The Adjutant General's Office relative to ordering to active duty Reserve officers who are performing the same class of work in civil life as the duty they will be called upon to perform under their war assignment. He has shown by the above mentioned tours of active duty training and his work in this office as a civilian employee that he is qualified to perform the duties of a Lieutenant Colonel, Signal Corps Reserve, "Cryptography" classification.





August 16 to 29, 1936, and April 11 to 24, 1937, have been designated as the active duty training periods for the Fiscal Year 1937 (July 1, 1936 to June 30, 1937), for Reserve officers assigned to this office. Effort will be made to arrange other suitable periods for officers who desire active duty training in this office or elsewhere but who cannot accept training during either of the regular periods.

2. In selecting trainees, the Chief Signal Officer is governed by available funds and the following War Department directives:

a. No Reserve officer who is drawing a pension, disability allowance, disability compensation or retired pay from the Government may be ordered to active duty.

b. Reserve officers, including Federal employees, who are performing work similar to that required of them under their mobilization assignment will be given a low priority for active duty training.


c. Except during his first year of service, no Reserve officer who has failed to complete at least 25 hours of inactive duty during the preceding year will be detailed for 14-day active duty; nor will any Reserve officer be so detailed in more than two consecutive years except in special cases.

d. Priority in active duty training will be given to those Reserve officers whose assignments are in the initial mobilization.

e. In the selection of Reserve officers for 14-day training all possible opportunity should be afforded recent graduates of the R.O.T.C. and those who will be commissioned this year.

3. In the hope that you will desire and can qualify, under paragraph 2 above, for active duty training during the fiscal year, there is attached hereto a form letter of application which should be completed, signed and returned to this office in duplicate not later than June 10, 1936.

REMARKS

This is a "three-year" case and consequently this amendment is

a reasonable response to the official letter of July 27, 1939. All 33 claims remain in the case.

The official letter of July 27, 1939 states that the claims are rejected on the art as previously applied. A study of the record indicates that claims 1, 2, 9, 10, 12, 13-16, 18-23, and 27 were previously rejected and a response to that rejection is contained herein.

The examiner in his letter of July 24, 1936 rejected all claims on the ground the structure and function of the universal bar is insufficiently disclosed. If applicant overcomes this ground of rejection it is then apparent that claims 3-8, 11, 17, 24-27, and 28-33 which have not heretofore been rejected on any ground other than inadequate disclosure are apparently allowable.

The term "universal bar" has a recognized meaning in the art and accordingly a detailed description of the function and mode of operation of a universal bar is not believed necessary. As was said by the Supreme Court in Webster Loom Co. v. Higgins, 105 U.S. 580, 586, and also in Carnegie Steel Co. v. Cambria Iron Co. 185 U.S. 403, 437: "that which is common and well known is as if it were written out in the patent and delineated in the drawings."

The applicant has amended the remaining claims in an attempt to conform to the examiner's views. If the examiner has ideas on specific changes of wording or showings in the drawings and desires to suggest any changes in wording or showings, applicant will be glad to receive the suggestions.

The claims are all thought to be patentable since the references do not use the output of their commutators to control the movement of the commutator but the keys themselves control the commutators. The cryptographic security of applicant's construction is therefore very much greater. This is one of those cases often found in patent matters where a simple change effects marked improvement in results - in this case a marked increase in cryptographic security. The claims call for a double function of the commutating means, one function to move the commutating means and another function

is to code the message. Moving the commutating means in an irregular fashion depending upon the cryptographed output of the commutating means is not found in the cited prior art patents.

Method claims 34 and 35 differ from the art cited by the examiner in that cryptographic relation for subsequent plain text characters is changed in a manner dependent on the cryptographic relationship of the character transmitted. New claims 36 and 37 relate specifically to the control commutator per se of Figure 2, in which a plurality of commutators are connected together. New claim 38 relates to a combination of a control commutators that respectively control the movement of the several commutators that constitute the main commutating means. Therefore claim 38 is patentable for the same reasons as claims 1-33, inclusive. Claim 39 covers the same subject matter as claim 36 except that it is slightly broader in scope, and it is patentable for the same reason.

1. Introductory note as to sources of data. - a. In preparing this thesis the writer has had access to the files of the Chief Signal Officer, including those of current as well as historical information. Among many other documents, the following may be mentioned:

- (1) Tables of Organization, Signal Intelligence Service
- (2) Technical Papers of the Signal Intelligence Section, War Plans and Training Division, Office of the Chief Signal Officer.
- (3) Army Regulations pertaining to codes and ciphers.
- (4) Letters pertaining to the work of the Signal Intelligence Service.

b. In addition, files pertaining to the World War, as contained in the World War Records Division of The Adjutant General, have also been studied. Among the latter were the following:

- (1) Final report of the Officer-in-Charge of the Radio Intelligence Section, General Staff, GHQ, AEF (G-2 - A6)
- (2) Final report of the Code Solving Subsection (G-2 - A6)
- (3) Final report of the Cipher Solving Subsection (G-2 - A6)

- (5) Final report of the Security Subsection (G-2 - A6)
- (6) Final report of the Administrative Subsection (G-2 - A6)

2. Basic authority for the Signal Intelligence Service. - a. Basic authority for the establishment of the Signal Intelligence Service is given in AR 105-25; March 15, 1933, as amended by Changes No. 1, August 21, 1934. Par. 2 e thereof now reads as follows:

"2. Duties of the Chief Signal Officer. - In addition to such other duties as may be prescribed, the Chief Signal Officer will have immediate charge, under the direction of the Secretary of War, of the following:

* * * *

e. The preparation, publication, revision, storage, accounting, and distribution of all codes and ciphers required by the Army, and in time of war the interception of enemy radio and wire traffic, the goniometric location of enemy radio stations, the solution of intercepted enemy code and cipher messages, and laboratory arrangements for the employment and detection of secret inks.

* * * *

3. Unit signal officers. - a. - A chief signal Officer will be detailed for every expeditionary force and a Signal Corps officer as unit signal officer will normally be detailed for each corps area and every tactical unit larger than a brigade containing Signal Corps troops. When no unit signal officer has been so detailed in orders, the senior Signal Corps Officer present for duty with the command will act as such. The unit signal officer will be a member of the staff of his commanding officer. He will be charged, under the direction of his commanding officer, with the command, in so far as relates to operations, of signal troops not assigned or attached to subordinate units. The unit signal officer is also charged with specific duties as follows:

* * * *

(3) Preparation, publication, storage, accounting, and distribution of codes and ciphers.

* * * *

(8) Supervision of the installation, maintenance, and operation of the signal communication system, including the message center, of the unit.

(9) Supervision of such activities pertaining to the meteorological, signal intelligence, pigeon, and photographic services as affect the unit."

* * * *

b. Based upon the foregoing authority, we may now study the following extracts from a directive given the Chief Signal Officer by the Secretary of War, in a letter dated April 22, 1930, dealing specifically with the Signal Intelligence Service:

"5. Upon mobilization the various activities of this service will operate at the following headquarters:

a. Under the War Department:

(1) The preparation of all means of secret communication employed by the Army in peace and war including secret inks, except that, upon its organization, GHQ will begin the preparation of field codes and ciphers required for current replacement for subordinate units.

(2) The interception of enemy communications by electrical means, including the necessary goniometric work incident thereto.

(3) The detection and solution of secret or disguised enemy communications including those written in code, cipher, secret ink or those employing other means for disguise.

b. At General Headquarters:

(1) The preparation of field codes and ciphers for employment by subordinate units to replace those previously prepared under the War Department during peace time.

(2) The interception of enemy communications by electrical means.

(3) The location of enemy radio transmitting stations by goniometric means.

(4) The detection and solution of secret or disguised enemy communications including those written in code, cipher, secret ink or those employing other means for disguise.

c. At Headquarters of Field Armies:

(1) The interception of enemy communications by electrical means.

(2) The location of enemy radio transmitting stations by goniometric means.

(3) The solution of intercepted enemy code or cipher messages by the assistance of cipher keys and solved codes as furnished by the service at General Headquarters."

3. Position occupied by the Signal Intelligence Service in the GHQ Signal Service. - a. Coming now directly to the manner in which the Signal Intelligence Service fits into the organization of the GHQ Signal Service, we find a graphic picture of the latter organization in T/O 507-W shown in Appendix I.

b. GHQ Signal Service consists of

- 1 Headquarters, GHQ Signal Service
- 2 Operation Companies
- 3 Meteorological Companies
- 1 Radio Intelligence Company
- 1 Construction Battalion

c. In T/O 507-W we are interested only in:

- (1) Headquarters, GHQ Signal Service
- (2) Radio Intelligence Company

4. Relations with Radio Intelligence Company, GHQ Signal Service. - a.

The Radio Intelligence Company, GHQ Signal Service, is the technical agency which intercepts enemy electrically-transmitted traffic and locates enemy transmitting stations by goniometry or radio direction finding. Copies of all intercepted enemy messages and the goniometric data are furnished directly to the GHQ Signal Intelligence Service. Copies of the plain-language messages, if any, are immediately forwarded to the G-2 section of the General Staff.

b. The GHQ Radio Intelligence Company also intercepts our own radio traffic, for purposes of furnishing information to the Communications Security Section of the GHQ Signal Intelligence Service. This will be discussed in detail under Par. 9 below.

c. The functions performed by the Radio Intelligence Company, GHQ Signal Service, as given under a and b above are performed by a similarly organized Radio Intelligence Company, Army Signal Service; the data obtained are furnished to the Signal Intelligence Service, Headquarters Army Signal Service. This must be mentioned for reasons which will become apparent subsequently.

5. Organization of the GHQ Signal Intelligence Service. - a. Coming now directly to the GHQ Signal Intelligence Service, we find a graphic picture of its organization in T/O 508-W, shown in Appendix I. As shown in the table, this service consists of the following sections:

- (1) Administrative
- (2) Enemy documents
- (3) Goniometric identification
- (4) Communications security
- (5) Secret inks
- (6) Code and cipher compilation
- (7) Code and cipher solution

b. Since T/O 508-W was approved the Signal Corps has been assigned the additional responsibilities of publishing, storing, distributing, and accounting of cryptographic publications. Although these added duties can be allocated to one of the sections of the code and cipher compilation section, it will be noted, nevertheless, that the additional work thus imposed upon the GHQ Signal Intelligence Service is of very great importance and will necessitate some expansion of the present authorized organization.

c. Each of the foregoing sections will be taken up in turn, the duties set forth, the relations with other sections, and all details connected with its efficient operation discussed.

6. Functions of administrative section. - a. The administrative section comprises the following subsections, the duties of which will be described presently:

- (1) Headquarters subsection
- (2) Correspondence subsection
- (3) Reproduction and tabulating machinery subsection
- (4) Files subsection
- (5) Communications subsection
- (6) Guard subsection
- (7) Liaison subsection
- (8) Library and current information subsection

b. The headquarters subsection handles all matters relating to the general policies of the service, the obtaining and administration of personnel, quarters, office equipment and supplies for the service. The officer-in-charge of the GHQ Signal Intelligence Service maintains his office in this subsection.

c. The correspondence subsection comprises the necessary stenographic and typing personnel for conducting the large volume of correspondence of the whole GHQ Signal Intelligence Service. It is deemed best to have a fairly large stenographic and typing pool so that the work may be centralized.

d. The reproduction and tabulating machinery subsection makes copies of texts, tables, etc., required for the various sections. This will include mimeographing, multigraphing, and other methods of reproducing copies. In addition, there will be needed certain machines usually employed for accounting purposes, but easily adaptable to cryptographic and cryptanalytic work. The use of such machines very greatly reduces the amount of time and labor involved in code compilation and in making statistical studies in cryptanalytic work.

e. The files subsection is a central agency for maintaining the files and records of the entire GHQ Signal Intelligence Service.

f. The communications subsection may have direct telegraph wires to Army Signal Intelligence Service headquarters, to outlying intercept stations, and to other places (for example, Navy Signal Intelligence Service headquarters), for the purpose of avoiding all delays in the transmission and receipt of messages relating strictly to the technical work of this service, especially that of the solution section, where time is of the utmost importance.

g. The guard subsection has supervision of the special sentries assigned to patrol the quarters occupied by the Signal Intelligence Service at all hours of the day and night. It is felt that these special guards are necessary in order to prevent the surreptitious operation of enemy agents in the vicinity of the quarters where most of the vitally secret work is carried on.

h. The liaison subsection maintains the necessary contacts with the Signal Intelligence Services of Field Armies, with other arms, with branches of the General Staff, with the Navy Signal Intelligence Service in case of joint action, and with the Signal Intelligence Services of Allied Governments, if any. In other words, the section serves as a central agency for coordination of work with other Signal Intelligence organizations, or with other agencies concerned in the results obtained.

i. The library and current information subsection maintains a small but fairly comprehensive library of books having a bearing on signal intelligence activities and of books likely to be necessary as sources of information for particular use of the solution section. Files of certain newspapers may be necessary if they are not readily accessible at GHQ. Reference books of special types are also required for cryptanalytic work that may not be available at the library of GHQ.

7. Functions of enemy documents section. - a. This section is the depository for documents relating to the signal service of the enemy in all its phases, but primarily as regards his signal intelligence organization, its agencies, operations, systems, and devices.

b. A small unit of translators is essential if the language of the enemy is different from our own. These persons must have some technical knowledge in signal intelligence in order to translate properly such documents in form suitable for our ready use.

c. The translators may also be called upon to assist personnel of the code and cipher solution section and for this reason also they must have a certain amount of training in cryptanalysis.

d. The importance of rapid forwarding of captured documents such as codes, cipher keys, files of cryptographed messages with their translations, to the Signal Intelligence Service is apparent. For this reason a special subsection is deemed advisable, the duties of which are to see that no time will be lost in bringing back captured documents and placing them in proper form for study by various interested personnel of the Signal Intelligence Service.

8. Functions of goniometric identification section. - a. The work of this section is primarily of interest to the Battle Order Section of G-2, and to the code and cipher solution section of the Signal Intelligence Service. It assists in enabling the latter to sort intercepted messages properly according to the enemy units from which they emanate and for which they are intended, since tactical messages rarely carry addresses and signatures in plain text, and externally carry few indications from which it may be determined whether two messages are in the same code, in the same cryptographic system, or in the same key.

b. This section works in close liaison with the Radio Intelligence Company assigned to GHQ. The latter intercepts the messages and records on them the location of the transmitting stations, as found by intersection from the radio-compass bearings taken on the emitted waves. The goniometric identification section records the locations and call signs of these stations on a suitable map, and from a study of intercommunicating stations, establishes the probable enemy radio nets. These nets are then analyzed with the point of view of identifying the units which the transmitting and receiving radio stations serve and this in turn, by noting the groupings which intercommunicating stations form, furnish valuable information concerning enemy order of battle.

c. Having identified the units in this manner, it is then possible to indicate on the intercepted messages the unit from which and to which they are coming and going, their location, the larger units to which they belong, etc. Thus, the messages can be sorted so as to isolate messages in the same cryptographic system, key, or in the same code. This is, of course, of primary importance to, and constitutes an essential preliminary step in solving the messages.

d. From the point of view of furnishing information concerning enemy order of battle, the work of this section is also of great value, since this information may be obtained at comparatively little expense, without entailing the loss of lives, and, moreover, in contrast to similar information obtainable from prisoners or spies, is not subject to psychological, or purposive distortion of the facts.

9. Functions of communications security section. - a. The work of this section is exclusively that of furnishing data for the supervision of our own signal communications from the point of view of their protection and the maintenance of security and secrecy in signal communication.

b. Its duties include the following:

(1) Study of our own messages to insure that the regulations governing cryptographic security are being observed. This involves analyzing radio messages transmitted by our own forces. The messages for this purpose are obtained by the Radio Intelligence Company assigned to GHQ and are forwarded to the Communications Security Section of the Signal Intelligence Service. The latter, of course, has the codes or ciphers and decryptographs the messages, devoting special attention to violations of the regulations essential to cryptographic security.

(2) Switchboard facilities are provided so that personnel of this section may cut in on important telephone lines and listen in on conversations for the purpose of noting indiscretions which might impair secrecy. Particular attention is devoted to listening for the mention of unit designations, plans of operation, troop movements and the like. It must be assumed that the enemy will attempt to intercept

and record such conversations by placing agents at strategic points suitable for this purpose. Direct tapping of the telephone wires is, of course, not necessary because by suitable apparatus the electrical currents may be detected by induction, amplified, and led away to a place where the conversations may be recorded with ease.

c. The personnel of this section should include a stenographer of considerable ability, so as to be able to record the conversations as rapidly as they are spoken, otherwise the evidence obtained might not be considered valid. All the listening-in personnel must be carefully selected for their discretion and integrity.

d. When serious violations are observed, one of two procedures may be followed. Under the first procedure a letter may be drafted, calling attention to the irregularities, and forwarded through the Adjutant General to the commanding officer of the organization concerned. If the violations continue and are of a serious nature, an inquiry may be held by the Inspector General's Department. Under the other procedure, it has been contemplated that an officer to be known as the Communications Security Officer would be designated in each large unit, whose duties would include the supervision of communications from the point of view of security. If this is the case, the liaison between the GHQ Communications Security Section and the unit security officer would be more direct. This would expedite the correction of irregularities leading to insecurity in communication by radio or other means.

10. Functions of secret inks section. - a. This section maintains and operates a laboratory for the preparation and detection of invisible writing fluids, and for the detection of other means of transmitting information to elude censorship, as for example, microscopic writing.

b. The subsection for preparation of secret inks functions only intermittently, when the G-2 section of GHQ desires to send out secret agents into enemy territory and must provide these agents with means for sending back information in a form that will escape detection by enemy censorship.

c. The subsection for detection functions continuously and is furnished its material by the censorship bureau. Documents suspected of containing invisible writing are passed through the various chemical tests, and if secret

writing is discovered the results of the examination are forwarded to G-2 for action.

d. This section works in closest liaison with the censorship agency, and also with the larger laboratory at the War Department, where better facilities and more personnel are available for research.

11. Functions of code and cipher compilation section. - a. This section comprises the following subsections, the duties of which will be briefly discussed in turn:

- (1) Headquarters subsection
- (2) Code compilation subsection
- (3) Cipher compilation subsection
- (4) Publication subsection
- (5) Storage subsection
- (6) Distribution subsection
- (7) Accounting subsection

b. The headquarters subsection has charge of the administrative details relative to assignment of work to personnel, the use of the equipment, and the issue of supplies to the individual members of the section. All correspondence pertaining to the production, distribution, and accounting of codes and ciphers is initiated in the subsections and then passed through this office before going to the Administrative Section of the Signal Intelligence Service for signature and transmittal.

c. The code compilation subsection compiles new editions of authorized codes, as are required by field forces, principally for the Division Field Code, Air-Ground Liaison Code, Radio Service Code, and Map Coordinate Code. Special codes adapted for special usage or entirely new codes the need for which is determined by the Commanding General, GHQ may be compiled.

d. The cipher compilation subsection prepares cipher tables, cipher keys, or cipher alphabets as may be required for use in connection with the various authorized codes, cipher systems and devices. It also has as one of its responsibilities the technical supervision and coordination of such automatic cryptographic machinery as may be employed for secret intercommunication among the highest headquarters of field forces.

e. The publication subsection has charge of the details pertaining to the printing and physical reproduction of copies of codes, ciphers, cipher tables, and cipher keys. If practicable, it should have facilities for printing or lithographic reproduction entirely under its own control, in order that proper safeguards may be established over this phase of secret communication facilities. However, if this is not practicable the printing and reproduction facilities of the Adjutant General, GHQ, or of the Engineer Reproduction Plant, GHQ, will have to be employed. The subsection is also responsible for all proofreading of galley and page proofs.

f. The storage subsection is the receiving office for printed cryptographic publications and is responsible for their safeguarding while in storage. It is necessary to provide it with suitable storage facilities, safes being preferable, and also with armed sentries to patrol the quarters at all hours during the day and night.

g. The code and cipher compilation section will make the most use of the automatic machinery referred to under par. 6 d. Without such machinery the section would either have to have much more personnel or else codes would have to be replaced less frequently.

12. Functions of code and cipher solution section. - a. This section comprises the following subsections:

- (1) Headquarters subsection
- (2) Distribution and records subsection
- (3) Codes subsection
- (4) Ciphers subsection
- (5) Research and training subsection

b. The headquarters subsection has charge of the administrative details relative to the assignment of work to the personnel of the section, the use of the equipment, and the issue of supplies to the individual members of the section. All correspondence pertaining to the work of the section, material furnished it for solution, the results accomplished, and liaison with other branches and agencies pass through this office before going to the Administrative Section for signature and transmittal. It also prepares daily, weekly, or monthly reports on cryptanalytic activities, which reports are intended for the G-2 section of the GHQ staff and must be forwarded to that section for evaluation, coordination and distribution to all concerned.

c. The distribution and records subsection distributes manuscript sheets, copies of messages, documents, etc., as received from the reproduction subsection of the Administrative Section direct to the personnel working upon the particular code or cipher concerned. Its personnel also are employed in indexing, tabulating, making frequency studies, etc., for the cryptanalytic staff.

d. The codes subsection studies and solves enemy code systems, attempts to reconstruct the codes as completely as possible, and decodes enemy messages so far as the reconstruction of the codes up to that moment will permit.

e. The ciphers subsection does the same type of work except on cipher systems.

f. The research and training subsection has the following duties:

(1) To investigate such new code and cipher systems, apparatus, and devices as are submitted to the Signal Officer, GHQ, for consideration for use by field forces.

(2) To conduct a school for the training of enlisted and officer personnel assigned to duty in the Signal Intelligence Service of GHQ or Army. Such training will be essential for personnel obtained from sources other than the Chief Signal Officer because no other agency exists in the military service for training in signal intelligence activities.

13. Relations with other branches of Signal Intelligence Service. - a. The GHQ Signal Intelligence Service must maintain close liaison with the following other branches of the Signal Intelligence Service of the military establishment:

(1) Army Signal Intelligence Service. The signal intelligence service at the headquarters of each field army serves as a sort of forward echelon of the GHQ Signal Intelligence Service. Its personnel are trained only so far as will enable them to decipher and decode enemy messages for which the keys have been worked out by GHQ Signal Intelligence Service. The purpose here is to permit of speed in utilizing the results that may be obtained from solutions of enemy messages intercepted within the radius of action of the field army.

At the same time, the Army Signal Intelligence serves as a source of material for work by GHQ Signal Intelligence Service, since the messages which are intercepted by the Radio Intelligence Company assigned to Army and which cannot be solved by Army Signal Intelligence Service are forwarded for solution to GHQ Signal Intelligence Service. The officer-in-charge of Army Signal Intelligence Service should have had adequate training and experience in the GHQ Signal Intelligence Service. His assistants do not require such thorough training, but obviously the more they have the better will be their work.

(2) War Department Signal Intelligence Service. The largest unit of the Signal Intelligence Service and the one best equipped to work with the more complicated enemy codes and ciphers should be located at the War Department in Washington. Here the non-military codes and ciphers of the enemy government are studied, as well as the codes and ciphers of enemy commercial houses, agents, etc. It may be that the GHQ Signal Intelligence Service is in a better position to intercept such material than is the War Department Signal Intelligence Service, in which case the former should spend no time trying to solve this non-military traffic but should merely forward it to Washington. On the other hand, the enemy's field codes and ciphers may be so complicated as to be beyond the ability of personnel at GHQ Signal Intelligence Service, in which case the War Department Signal Intelligence Service may be called upon for cooperation and assistance.

(3) Corps Area and Department Signal Intelligence Services. If branches of the Signal Intelligence Service are established at the headquarters of corps areas and departments, liaison may be necessary between them and GHQ Signal Intelligence Service, for purposes of coordination, cooperation, and avoidance of duplication of effort.

b. It must also act in close liaison with the following:

(1) Censorship representative, GHQ. The censorship bureau will undoubtedly have offices in the Theater of Operations. Matters requiring cooperation between the Signal Intelligence Service and censorship authorities in this region will require close liaison.

(2) Navy Signal Intelligence Service. The Theater of Operations may be located in such an area that direct liaison with Navy Signal Intelligence Service Afloat or Ashore is more conducive to good cooperation with GHQ Signal Intelligence Service than indirect liaison through the War Department Signal Intelligence Service, such direct contact should be established.

(3) Signal Intelligence Services of allied governments. - During the World War, the liaison that existed between the Radio Intelligence Section, G-2, GHQ, AEF, and the same service of French GHQ and British GHQ was most conducive to cooperation and elimination of duplication of effort. In case our government is engaged in a war conducted with Allies against a common enemy, such liaison may again be essential.

c. It will be seen from the foregoing that the activities of the Liaison Subsection of the Administrative Section, GHQ Signal Intelligence Service (par. 6a (7) above) are quite important and necessary for achieving the best results possible from coordinated efforts to solve all kinds of enemy communications.

14. Duties of the officer-in-charge of the GHQ Signal Intelligence Service. -

a. It is the responsibility of the officer-in-charge of the GHQ Signal Service to administer the service under his charge in such a way that the functions of each section of his office, as outlined above, are efficiently conducted and that the service as a whole fulfills the mission assigned to it. He cannot be expected to be and, in fact, he may not be an expert cryptographer or an accomplished cryptanalyst, but he should know enough about these subjects to recognize the limitations that abound in practical work in these fields. He must realize first of all that the personnel assigned to him or selected by him are assumed to possess basic technical qualifications for the work and that if success does not crown their efforts or if it seems to him to come only too

slowly, this is inherent in the work itself: "supermind performances" are not the forte of cryptanalytic personnel, popular concepts to the contrary notwithstanding. It cannot be too strongly emphasized that cryptanalytic studies require a great deal of patience on the part of its working personnel; on the part of its directing and administrative personnel a similar degree of patience must be forthcoming. It is only rarely that spectacular situations and successes arise in the course of the work.

b. The last statement leads quite directly to a point which is touched upon with a certain amount of hesitancy but which nevertheless must be mentioned. As said before, signal intelligence is a specialty and its successes are rarely of a spectacular nature. They are, in this respect, quite different from the notable achievements which are much more frequently brought to light on the battlefield by brilliant tactics, resolute action, courage and fortitude. To those who have the good fortune to succeed on the battlefield, recognition and advancement come quickly, and this is of material importance toward the establishment and maintenance of a high stage of morale. But the successes of signal intelligence personnel, even when they do come (and they come only infrequently, very slowly, and most often as the result of long, hard labor), must usually be kept secret or, at the least, confidential. Consequently, these successes never can meet with popular acclaim and never can be awarded open recognition until long afterward. If, under these circumstances, promotion and advancement come more slowly than they do in other fields of action, the result is apt to be detrimental to the morale of the plodders in the signal intelligence field. It therefore is incumbent upon the officer-in-charge of the signal intelligence service to see that his personnel is accorded recognition for efficient, conscientious work in the same degree and with the same benefits as is accorded deserving personnel in the combat zone.

c. Finally, it is extremely important that the officer-in-charge realize that a vital factor in attaining success in signal intelligence work is the fostering of a competitive spirit among all personnel concerned but at the same time repressing to the utmost any spirit of professional jealousy, and any

attempts to deprive others of credit due for good work, merely for the sake of personal advancement of the offender. The officer-in-charge of each branch of the Signal Intelligence Service, wherever located, must be constantly on guard to prevent such destructive forces from gaining a foothold among his subordinates for the good and sufficient reason, aside from the one of fair play, that whereas the spirit of competition on a purely scientific basis is conducive to the production of results, will spur on his subordinates to do their very best, and will bring about a good state of morale, the corroding spirit of professional jealousy based merely upon avidity for personal distinction and advancement will not only disrupt a good organization but will prevent the establishment and maintenance of real cooperation. It may be stated that in signal intelligence work, especially in that of cryptanalysis, cooperation and coordinated effort are absolutely essential. The efforts of even a good many individuals, if each works alone, will avail very little; only good teamwork will produce results and will bring success in the assigned mission.

1. 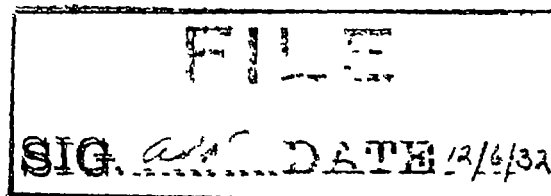

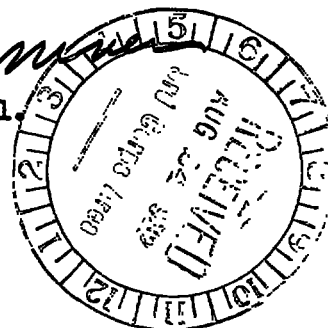

1. PROMOTIONS AND TRANSFERS - These will be made as provided in the regulations. Applications should be submitted to the Corps Area or Department Commander.

2. RELATIVE RANK IN GRADE - The National Defense Act, as amended, provides, concerning rank of officers, as follows:

"Unless special assignment is made by the President under the provisions of the one hundred and nineteenth article of war, all officers in the active service of the United States in any grade shall take rank according to date, which, in the case of an officer of the Regular Army, is that stated in his commission or letter of appointment, and, in the case of a Reserve officer or an officer of the National Guard called into the service of the United States, shall precede that on which he is placed on active duty by a period equal to the total length of active Federal service and service under the provisions of Sections 94, 97, and 99 of this Act which he may have performed in the grade in which called or any higher grade. When dates of rank are the same, precedence shall be determined by length of active commissioned service in the Army. When length of such service is the same, officers of the Regular Army shall take rank among themselves according to their places on the promotion list, preceding Reserve and National Guard officers of the same date of rank and length of service, who shall take rank among themselves according to age." Service in the Officers' Reserve Corps in inactive status cannot, under the law, be credited in determining relative rank.

3. EXTENSION COURSES - Have been prepared by most of the Branches. These courses and many of the publications used as texts are furnished without charge. Corps Area and Department Commanders will supply full information concerning the extension courses upon request.

4. MILITARY SOCIETIES AND THEIR PUBLICATIONS - To enable Reserve officers to keep informed of current military events, and to keep in touch with latest developments, pending the issue of definite instructions by the War Department, they are encouraged to join the Association of officers of their arm and subscribe to its journal. "The Infantry Journal", The U. S. Infantry Association; "The Cavalry Journal", The U. S. Cavalry Association; "The Field Artillery Journal", The U. S. Field Artillery Association, 1624 H Street, N.W., Washington, D.C.; "The Quartermaster Review", 923 - 15th Street, N.W.; "The Military Engineer", The Society of American Military Engineers, 322 Mills Building; "The Military Surgeon", published by the Association of Military Surgeons of the U. S., Army Medical Museum; "The Military Dental Journal", published by the Association of Military Dental Surgeons of the U. S., 1801 16th Street, N.W., all the above published at Washington, D. C., by the respective Societies and Associations named above; "The Medical Bulletin", published at the Medical Field Service School, Carlisle Barracks, Pa.,

"The Coast Artillery Journal", published at Fort Monroe, Va., and "Army Ordnance", published by the Army Ordnance Association, Room 410 Munsey Bldg., Washington, D. C., contain information of value and of interest to all officers of the particular arm concerned and also contain matter of special interest to Reserve officers. Most of them have a special department for the instruction of Reserve officers.

5. PUBLICATIONS BY CHIEFS OF BRANCHES - The Field Artillery School at Fort Sill, Oklahoma, the U. S. Signal Corps, Washington, D. C., the Office of the Chief of Finance, and the Chemical Warfare Service, Edgewood, Maryland, issue mimeographed or printed bulletins from time to time, which are mailed to officers of their respective sections and if these have not been received and are desired, will be supplied on application.

6. WAR DEPARTMENT PUBLICATIONS - USE OF UNIT LIBRARIES - The War Department cannot at the present time on account of lack of funds, undertake to furnish Reserve officers with publications other than those supplied with extension courses. Reserve officers may avail themselves of the use of the libraries established at headquarters of those units of the Organized Reserves at which an officer of the Regular Army is on duty. The Superintendent of Documents, Government Printing Office, Washington, D. C., issues a price-list of official military publications from time to time, which may be procured upon request. These publications are sold for the cost of printing and will assist the Reserve officer to keep abreast of the latest military thought. Also see Circular No. 5, War Department, January 30, 1928, for list of publications of special value to Reserve officers.

7. ACTIVE DUTY - WHEN CONSENT IS REQUIRED - PAY AND ALLOWANCES - To the extent provided for by appropriations for this specific purpose the President may order a Reserve officer to active duty with any of the military forces of the United States at any time for any period, but except in time of a National Emergency expressly declared by Congress, no Reserve officer shall be employed on active duty for more than fifteen days in any one calendar year without his consent. The Act approved June 10, 1922, provides base pay while on active duty as: Second Lieutenant, \$1500; First Lieutenant, \$2000, Captain, \$2400; Major, \$3000, Lieutenant Colonel, \$3500, Colonel \$4000, with a five percent increase of pay for each period of three years' service. In computing the increase of pay for each period of three years' service, such officers shall be credited with full time for all periods during which they have held commissions as officers of the Army, Navy, Marine Corps, Coast Guard, Coast and Geodetic Survey, and Public Health Service, or in the Organized Militia prior to July 1, 1916, or in the National Guard, or in the Naval Militia, or in the National Naval Volunteers, or in the Naval Reserve Force or Marine Corps Reserve Force, when confirmed in grade and qualified for all general service, with full time for all periods during which they have performed active duty under Reserve commissions, and with one-half time for all other periods during which they have held Reserve commissions. Allowances while on active duty will be at the rate for the corresponding grade in the Regular Army under similar circumstances. Mileage at the prescribed rate from homes to first stations and from last stations to homes is authorized, except that the Army Appropriation Acts for the fiscal year July 1, 1923 - June 30, 1924, and subsequent years, limit to four

cents per mile, the mileage for Reserve officers ordered for fifteen day training periods or less, or if Quartermaster transportation is secured, to that transportation plus one cent per mile traveled. The Comptroller General has decided that transportation for dependents from home to first station and from last station to home is not authorized (W.D. Cir. 98, 1922). Concerning rental allowances, an Act approved May 31, 1924, provides in part as follows:

"Except as otherwise provided in the fourth paragraph of this section, each commissioned officer below the grade of Brigadier General or its equivalent, in any of the services mentioned in the title of this Act, while either on active duty or entitled to active duty pay shall be entitled at all times to a money allowance for rental of quarters."

Paragraph 4 of that Section reads:

"No rental allowance shall accrue to an officer, having no dependents, while he is on field or sea duty, nor while an officer with or without dependents is assigned as quarters at his permanent station the number of rooms provided by law for an officer of his rank or a less number of rooms in any particular case wherein, in the judgement of competent superior authority of the service concerned, a less number of rooms would be adequate for the occupancy of the officer and his dependents."

The law provides that a Reserve officer who shall become entitled for a continuous period of less than one month to Federal pay for active duty shall receive such pay for each day of such period; and the thirty-first day of a calendar month shall not be excluded from the computation. The pay of a Reserve officer when ordered to active duty begins on the date on which he starts to obey his order. Payment of pay and allowances, including pay and mileage for his return home, may be paid to a Reserve officer, on active duty for less than one month, prior to his departure from the camp or other place at which such service is performed. There is no provision for pay while in inactive status. A Reserve officer of the Army is not entitled by law to retirement or retired pay.

An Act approved March 4, 1923, as amended, provides in part:

"That --- members of the Officers' Reserve Corps and of the enlisted reserve corps of the Army who suffer personal injury or contract disease in line of duty while on active duty under proper orders; --- shall, under such regulations as the President may prescribe, when hospital treatment is necessary for appropriate treatment of such injury or disease, be entitled to hospital treatment, including medical treatment, at Government expense until the disability resulting from such injury or disease cannot be materially improved by further hospital treatment, and, during the period of hospitalization, to the same pay and allowances whether in money or in kind that they were entitled to receive at the time such injury was suffered or disease contracted, and to transportation to their homes at Government expense when discharged from hospital; they shall also be entitled to such further medical treatment for such injury or disease as is reasonably necessary after arrival at their homes under such regulations as may be prescribed by the President, --- and members of the Officers' Reserve Corps and Enlisted Reserve Corps of

the Army injured in line of duty while voluntarily participating in aerial flights in Government-owned aircraft by proper authority as an incident to their military training, but not on active duty, shall, under regulations prescribed as aforesaid, be entitled to the same hospital treatment, including medical treatment, pay and allowances, and transportation to their homes, and further medical treatment after arrival at their homes, as if such injury had been suffered while on active duty under proper orders. No person hospitalized under the foregoing provisions of this section on account of any personal injury suffered or disease contracted shall be entitled to receive, in connection with such injury or disease, pay or allowance other than hospital treatment, including medical treatment, and transportation, as herein provided, for more than six months; but for any remaining period of such hospitalization he shall be entitled to subsistence at Government expense. --- If the death of any person mentioned herein occurs while he is undergoing the training or medical and hospital treatment contemplated in this section, the United States shall pay for burial expenses and the return of the body to his home a sum not to exceed \$100, as may be fixed in regulations prescribed by the President."

8. ACTIVE DUTY - WHO MAY BE ORDERED - Only the following classes of Reserve officers may be ordered to active duty from funds appropriated for the Organized Reserves:

(a) Any Reserve officer for not to exceed fifteen days during the fiscal year. This will comprise those officers selected for training for fifteen days periods or less. Application therefor should be addressed to the Corps Area Commander.

(b) Such officers as may be detailed for courses of instruction in the general or special service schools of the Army.

(c) Such officers as may be detailed for duty as instructors in Citizens' Military Training Camps appropriated for in the Appropriation Act for the support of the Army.

(d) Such officers as may be detailed for duty with the tactical units of the Air Corps.

(e) Such officers as may be detailed for duty with the War Department General Staff.

The number of officers who will be ordered to active duty during the fiscal year will be limited owing to the fact that the appropriations for this purpose cannot be exceeded.

9. INACTIVE STATUS TRAINING - TARGET PRACTICE, ETC. - Reserve officers in inactive status may be assigned by Corps Area and Department Commanders to organizations or establishments of the Regular Army for instruction, target practice, field exercises, et cetera, at their own request, but without pay. All proper steps will be taken to reduce to a minimum the expense of officers who seek training at their own expense. Reserve officers also may be attached to units of the National Guard for target practice provided the state authorities consent and instruction and firing can be arranged conveniently. Application for assignment under this authority should be made to the Corps Area or Department Commander, under whose juris-

diction permanent address is maintained. For Reserve officers desiring to engage in target practice, appropriate allowance of ammunition will be made. For detailed information on this subject the Corps Area Commander should be consulted.

10. UNIFORMS AND EQUIPMENT - PURCHASE THEREOF - SALES OF SUBSISTENCE TO INACTIVE RESERVE OFFICERS NOT AUTHORIZED - Reserve officers must provide themselves with field uniforms with proper insignia, for use when ordered to active duty. Other than clothing, everything needed by such officers will be issued when ordered to active duty, except such articles as they may have previously purchased from the War Department. Reserve officers not on active duty, after proper identification, may purchase under certain conditions and in such quantities as would be required by them when called into active Federal service, and at such places as may be designated in orders or from sales stores or other points of supply in the department or corps area in which they reside, necessary uniforms, accouterments and equipment at the same prices at which such articles are furnished to officers of the Regular Army. When in doubt as to the nearest point of supply, application should be directed to the Corps Area or Department Commander. Sales of Subsistence stores are not authorized to Reserve officers on the inactive list.

11. UNIFORM AND INSIGNIA - WEARING OF - The uniform and insignia prescribed for officers of the Officers' Reserve Corps are identical with those prescribed for officers of the Regular Army. The superimposed "R" is no longer worn. Officers holding commission in sections for which no insignia are prescribed, will wear a cut out coat-of-arms of the United States within a ring.

(a) Reserve officers not members of the Regular Army or National Guard, not on active duty and within the United States or its possessions, may wear the uniform on occasions of military ceremony, at social functions of a military character, at informal gatherings of the same character, and when engaged in the military instruction of a cadet corps or similar organization, or when responsible for the military discipline at an educational institution. Such Reserve officers may also wear the uniform when attached to an organization for target practice, when visiting a military station for participation in military drills or exercises or when assembled for the purpose of instruction.

(b) Reserve officers not on active duty, and outside of the United States or its possessions will not, except when granted authority, wear the uniform. Such officers, on occasions of military ceremony or other military functions, may, upon reporting to the nearest military attache and having their status accredited, be granted authority to appear in uniform. (In case there is no military attache accredited to the country in question, authority to wear the uniform for a specific occasion should be obtained from the proper civil or military authorities of the country in question).

12. LAPEL BUTTON - A lapel button for optional wear on civilian clothes only, by members of the Officers' Reserve Corps has been approved. The specifications are as follows: A circular button of gold or gilt $\frac{1}{2}$ -inch in diameter with face enameled in the color of the facings of the arm or corps; surrounded by a narrow circle of gold or gilt and with the letters "U.S.R." in the center. These letters to be in gold or gilt when there is but one color in the facings; when there are two colors, the letters will be in the color of the piping or second color. The Button will be green for officers commissioned in a section for which no color is provided, and it will be gold, with letters in relief,

for general officers. These buttons will not be furnished by the War Department but may be obtained from dealers in military goods. The design of these buttons will conform to the drawings in the office of The Quartermaster General.

13 ABSENCE FROM THE UNITED STATES - NOT ELIGIBLE FOR REAPPOINTMENT.

Any officer of the Reserve Corps desiring to leave the limits of the United States for a period of more than thirty days will notify The Adjutant General, through military channels, of the place, approximate date, and probable duration of his travel or temporary residence abroad. Former restrictions on duration of foreign residence or travel have been removed. Any such officer will keep The Adjutant General informed of his correct address and will promptly report return to the United States, giving his permanent address. It is desirable that any such officer report his presence and address in any foreign country to the nearest United States Military Attache. The War Department has made arrangements with the Ministry of Public Works, France, whereby Reserve officers who come to France and who desire to perfect themselves in French may be referred to suitable French families where they can be boarded and lodged, partake of the family life, and rapidly learn French under favorable and economical conditions. Any Reserve officer interested should write directly to the "Office National de Tourisme", 17 rue de Suresne, Paris.

Reserve officers are not eligible for training, active duty, promotion or reappointment while abroad.

Any Reserve officer whose appointment will expire while abroad and within six months of his departure from the United States, and who desires to qualify for reappointment prior to such departure, may take up that matter with his Corps Area Commander.

14. NATIONAL GUARD - HOLDING COMMISSION THEREIN BY RESERVE OFFICER -

The amendment approved September 22, 1922, to the National Defense Act provides as follows:

"Any person commissioned in the National Guard and recognized as a National Guard officer by the Secretary of War, may upon his own application, be appointed as a Reserve officer in the grade held by him in the National Guard."

The word "commissioned" in the amendment quoted above is applied to any person who holds a federally recognized commission on the active list of the National Guard at date of appointment in the Officers' Reserve Corps.

(a) Section 38, National Defense Act as amended June 6, 1924, provides in part:

"Officers of the National Guard federally recognized as such under the provisions of this Act, who are appointed Reserve officers under the provisions of Section 37 of this Act, shall be appointed for the period during which such recognition shall continue in effect and terminating at the expiration thereof in lieu of the five-year period heretofore prescribed, and in time of peace shall be governed by such special regulations appropriate for this class of Reserve officers as the Secretary of War may prescribe."

15. RESIGNATION - Reserve officers may submit, by letter, through military channels to The Adjutant General, stating their reasons therefor, resignations from their commissions at any time, but the acceptance thereof is at the discretion of the President.

16. ADDRESS - NOTICE OF CHANGE - SIGNATURE - Notice of each change of permanent address should be sent promptly through military channels, including in all cases the corps area or department commander, to The Adjutant General of the Army. A.G.O. Form 172 (old 112) is provided for this purpose. If a communication is received from an office of the military establishment incorrectly addressed, attention should be called to that fact. In all military correspondence it is essential that the name be spelled out in full, special attention being paid to legibility and that the grade and section in the Officers' Reserve Corps be indicated, and that autographic signature be affixed.

17. VALIDITY - Any instructions contained herein which come in conflict with regulations as issued from time to time will be superseded by such regulations.

18. CONCLUSION - COMMENTS INVITED - In conclusion, attention is invited to the fact that each Reserve officer is an officer of the Army of the United States and has an interest in it. Any comments, suggestions, or plans for the advancement of the Organized Reserves, or any other component of the Army, will be welcomed as a valuable aid in the development of the Military establishment to the end that it may better serve its purpose in the plan of National Defense.

SUBJECT: Command and General Staff School Course.

TO: Major W. F. Friedman, Sig-Off.,
Office of the Chief Signal Officer.

1. It is desired to bring to your attention as an officer in the class eligible for attendance at the Command and General Staff School, Fort Leavenworth, Kansas, some of the benefits to be derived from the pursuance of this course.

2. The mission of the Command and General Staff School is to prepare officers for command and general staff duty --

a. By training them in --

- (1) The tactics and technique of the associated arms to the degree necessary to assure proper coordination.
- (2) The operation of large units to include the corps acting alone or within the army.
- (3) The functions of commanders, staffs, and services of large units to include the corps acting alone or within the army.
- (4) Corps area general staff duty in time of peace and us pertaining to the zone of the interior in time of war.

b. By teaching military history, including method of historical research and historical illustrations of tactical principles.

3. In addition to the regular 2-year course for regular officers, a 3-months' course is conducted annually for eligible officers of the National Guard and the Officers' Reserve Corps. While attendance at this course is voluntary, it is felt that all field officers of the Signal Reserve Corps who are not ineligible because of age limitations should endeavor to attend.

4. Signal Reserve Officers of field grade, unless assigned in time of war to special duties such as procurement, will serve as signal officers of large units or will be concerned with policies and doctrines for the employment of means of communication in or between large units. An understanding of the tactical missions of such units will be invaluable.

5. The satisfactory completion of this course opens the way to eligibility for general staff assignment. It also exempts graduates from examination in those subjects listed as military knowledge qualifications for promotion to the grades of lieutenant colonel and colonel. (Army Regulations 140-38.) Each day of active duty earns a credit of seven hours toward reappointment.

6. The requirements for attendance at the Command and General Staff School course are as follows: The applicant must --

- a. Be of field grade (major or higher).
- b. Not be a member of the National Guard.
- c. Not be more than 48 years of age unless he possesses exceptional qualifications, in which case the age limit is 50 years.
- d. Not be on the Emergency Officers' Retired List nor be drawing compensation from the Government for physical disability.
- e. Be in good physical condition.
- f. Have completed successfully at least the first four subcourses of the Command and General Staff Extension Course.

7. It is realized that most officers are able to meet all requirements except the one stated in paragraph 6 f above. Officers who desire to enroll in the Command and General Staff Extension Course should submit their application therefor to the commanding general of the corps area in which they reside. Full information concerning Army Extension Courses and an enrollment application form may be obtained from the headquarters of the corps area in which you reside.

8. Application for attendance at the Command and General Staff School course which begins about March 15, 1933, should be forwarded to the Chief Signal Officer in time to be received not later than October 1, 1932. The following statements must be made in the applications:

- a. That you will accept the assignment if ordered to active duty for the purpose.
- b. That you are not a member of the National Guard.
- c. Date of birth.
- d. That you are not on the Emergency Officers' Retired List and that you are not receiving compensation from the Government for physical disability.
- e. Number and age of dependents. (Public quarters are not available for reserve officers attending the course. Rental allowance is paid.)

f. Amount and kinds of prior service claimed which can be credited in computing longevity pay.

g. Progress in the Command and General Staff Extension Course. (Number of sub-courses completed.)

9. Your application must be accompanied by a report of physical examination on War Department Form No. 63, preferably by a medical officer of the Regular Army, containing a statement by the medical examiner that you are considered physically fitted to meet the requirements of the mental, mounted, and field work.

10. The Chief Signal Officer hopes that you will find it practicable to apply for this course at an early date.

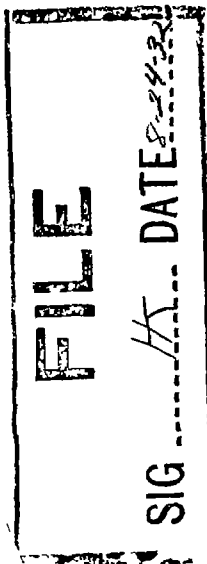



Under the 1928 Signal Corps General Mobilization Plan set up for the Branch Overhead (Arm and Service Assignment Group - formerly the Branch Assignment Group) you have been assigned to the Signal Intelligence Division, Office of the Chief Signal Officer, for duty, in time of national emergency, under the Chief Signal Officer.

2. Paragraph 3, Army Regulations 140-38, dated May 20, 1931, copy inclosed, calls for the classification of Signal Corps Reserve Officers. In view thereof and in keeping with your present assignment you have been placed in the following classification:

5. The records of this office show that you have met the requirements of paragraphs 32 a (1), and 32 a (4), Army Regulations 140-5. You will not meet the requirements of paragraph 32 a (3), Army Regulations 140-5, until December 6, 1931. There is no appropriate vacancy, paragraph 32 a (2), Army Regulations 140-5, in the Arm and Service Assignment Group, under the 1928 Signal Corps General Mobilization Plan, in the grade of Lieutenant Colonel, Signal Corps Reserve. It is not known when a vacancy will occur. When a vacancy occurs, however, you will be considered, if eligible at that time, along with other qualified officers, for promotion thereto.

6. With a view to you always being carried on the list of eligibles for promotion, should you not have been promoted by the time your eligibility therefor, based upon 300 hours credit, has terminated, it is suggested that you take the necessary steps to obtain a Certificate of Capacity for the grade of Lieutenant Colonel, Signal Corps Reserve. In this connection attention is invited to paragraphs 34 to 42, inclusive, Army Regulations 140-5.

7. This office will be glad to furnish any further information which you may desire relative to the foregoing.

8. The address used above is carried on War Department records as your permanent address and any change therein should be promptly reported to The Adjutant General, through the Commanding General, Third Corps Area, Baltimore, Maryland.

Report on Investigation for the Department of State

1. Pursuant to authority contained in the 2d Indorsement, dated November 4, 1931, to a letter dated October 29, 1931, from the Department of State to the Secretary of War, a study was initiated to determine only the degree of cryptographic security afforded by the above-mentioned cipher machine.

2. A theoretical method of solving cryptograms produced by this machine, without possession of either the machine or a knowledge of the particular key settings employed in their production was quickly established.

3. Two sets of cryptograms were requested for test, as set forth in the attached Exhibit 1. The messages were delivered to this office under sealed cover and were received at the times indicated on the photostatic copies, Exhibits 2 to 9, inclusive.

4. As regards the first set of messages, the only information given by the State Department was that each message had been enciphered by a different 10-letter keyword. Attached hereto, labeled Exhibits 10 to 13, inclusive, are the solutions to Messages 1, 6, 7, and 8, of the set of 12 messages furnished as Set A. There seemed to be no point in solving all the messages of this set, it being deemed satisfactory to demonstrate, by solving any four of them, the possibility of solving any messages of this category, all with independent initial key settings. It may be stated that, with practice, any message of this type may be solved within an hour or less.

5. As regards the second set of messages, Set B, the only information given by the State Department was that these four messages were the 3rd, 4th, 5th and 6th of a series enciphered from an initial setting known only to them. Attached hereto, labeled Exhibits 14 to 17, inclusive, are the solutions to all four messages thus furnished. It may be stated, as regards this method of employing the machine, that if a series of 10 or more messages is available, the determination of the proper initial setting for the series can be reached within 24 hours, possibly only 12 hours. From that point on, however, all messages can be deciphered as rapidly as the legitimate correspondents can decipher them, providing a duplicate machine is available. If no duplicate machine is at hand, then the question of quick translation becomes one merely of available clerical personnel.

With reference to the tests to be made of the cryptographic security afforded by the cipher apparatus recently installed in your office for demonstration purposes by the International Telephone & Telegraph Corporation, it is requested that the following cipher messages be furnished:

- a. One set of 15 independent messages each enciphered by means of a different 10-letter key-word, the latter being known only to your office.
- b. One set of 10 consecutive messages, the absolute position of these messages in a long series of messages enciphered consecutively from an initial keyword being known only to your office. This test is intended to simulate intercept conditions that would obtain if the machine should be employed in accordance with the present International Telephone & Telegraph method of starting with a selected or predetermined initial key-word and not resetting the wheels for consecutive messages. This condition assumes that the interceptor would not have started his interception with the very first messages enciphered, and would therefore not know how far the messages he is trying to solve are from the initial keysetting. To produce the 10 consecutive messages desired for test, it is suggested that, beginning with a keysetting known only to your office, you encipher a series of X messages (X being any number greater than 10) and furnish this office with any 10 consecutive messages of this series. These 10 messages should merely be numbered consecutively 1, 2, 3 ..., in the relative order of their encipherment.

All test messages should be deciphered by your office, to preclude the possibility of errors, before being forwarded to this office.

- (7) Mr. Friedman has demonstrated exceptional ability as a cryptanalyst, not only in executing the technical details of the work involved, but also in administration, research and instruction along these lines. He is, without doubt, the leading authority on codes and ciphers in this country. He is often consulted by other governmental agencies and renders valuable assistance to them in the solution of their problems connected with secret communication in general. In 1929 responsibility for the solution of enemy codes and ciphers and the preparation and detection of secret inks was transferred from the Military Intelligence Division, General Staff, to the Signal Corps. Until this time, the Signal Corps had responsibility only for the compilation of codes and ciphers for the use of the Army, and for intercept and radio goniometric work in war time. Mr. Friedman has been in charge of these activities since 1921. The newly transferred responsibilities connected with solution of enemy codes and ciphers, and the preparation and detection of secret inks necessitated the organization of a new service termed the Signal Intelligence Service of the Signal Corps. Mr. Friedman was placed in charge of the Signal Intelligence Section of the Office of the Chief Signal Officer, under the Officer in Charge of the War Plans and Training Division. Mr. Friedman has been largely responsible for organizing the work of the new section, has prepared both residence and correspondence courses of instruction for cryptanalysts, and, in addition, has conducted all the regular work of the section in compilation and solution of codes and ciphers. He has demonstrated his fitness to carry the additional large responsibilities entailed by the transfer of code and cipher activities of the Military Intelligence Division as noted above. Since his original appointment in 1921, carrying compensation at the rate of \$4800 per year, the two increases in compensation he has received were the result of automatic adjustments in salary scales occasioned by the Reclassification Act of 1924 (from \$4800 to \$5200) and the Welch Bill of 1928 (from \$5200 to \$5600). When the solution activities now under Mr. Friedman were conducted by the Military Intelligence Division, the salary of the Chief of the Code Section thereunder was \$7500 per year.

From June 1918 to April 1919 he was First Lieutenant, M.I.D., U.S.A., in charge of code work in the G-2 section of GHQ-AEF. From April 1919 to December 1920 he was again director of the cipher department Riverbank Laboratories. From January 1920 to December 31, 1920 he was engaged as consultant in code work for the Office of the Chief Signal Officer, Washington, on a contractual basis. He entered the Civil Service on December 31, 1921 under the provisions of Section 10 of Rule II of the Civil Service Act. His practical experience in the cryptographic field within the past fifteen years has been more extensive than that of any other person in this country, and it may be said that his experience, ability, and success, in this type of work make him preeminently the leading authority on codes and ciphers in this country. As such he was commissioned in 1928 to prepare the article on this subject for the New Encyclopaedia Britannica.

Signal Corps Civilian Personnel Board (THROUGH Executive Officer, Office of Chief Signal Officer).

1. Reference is made to a letter dated October 7, 1930, from the Chief Signal Officer, subject as above. The data called for under the above-mentioned letter are applicable to the civilian personnel of the Signal Intelligence Section of this division, since the employees of this section are carried on the rolls as field employees of the Signal Service at Large.

2. The specific recommendations set forth below under subparagraphs (a), (b), and (c) are submitted for the consideration of the board. Accompanying the recommendations of subparagraph (a) are completed questionnaires drawn up in accordance with the instructions contained in War Department memorandum of February 13, 1928, addressed to Chiefs of Bureaus having field services.

(a) Increases or decreases in compensation.

Specific Recommendations for Increases as below:

(b) No new positions are considered essential at this time.

(c) No positions can be eliminated without manifest injury to the activities under my jurisdiction.

3. The paragraphs which follow are in connection with the

recommendations contained in subparagraph (a) above, especially as regards the new personnel of the Signal Intelligence Section. Although the information given may have no direct bearing upon the subject at hand, viz., recommendations for promotions, it is presented in order to afford the Board some background for special consideration of the factors involved in their cases.

4. Until 1929, so far as code and cipher work is concerned, the Signal Corps was charged with the responsibility for only the preparation and revision of codes and ciphers for the use of the Army, and the production of cipher devices and machinery. Only a small amount of research in the solution of codes and ciphers was involved. From 1921 to 1929, these code compilation activities were conducted by a section consisting of two persons, viz., a cryptanalyst and a clerk. Under Change No. 1, Army Regulation 105-5, (May 10, 1929), responsibility for all work connected with codes and ciphers, including the solution of enemy codes and ciphers and the preparation and detection of secret inks, was transferred from the Military Intelligence Division, General Staff, to the Signal Corps. The Principal purpose of this transfer was to concentrate all work connected with codes and ciphers under one authority, so that a permanent, continuously operative organization for cryptographic work could be established during peace time, which, as a result of a proper organization and training, would be prepared for immediate and successful operation in war time. As a consequence of this transfer the organization of a Signal Intelligence Service was proposed, the headquarters section of which was to be maintained in the Office of the Chief Signal Officer as one section of the War Plans and Training Division. The interest that the Military Intelligence Division took in this proposal and the importance with which its prompt accomplishment was regarded by them may be gauged by the fact that they provided funds for the operation of the proposed Service for the remainder of the fiscal year 1929, viz., \$6666.66, and for the whole fiscal year 1930, viz., \$10,000.

5. The first step in the organization of the Signal Intelligence Service was the transfer of what has theretofore been the Code and Cipher Compilation Section, O.C.Sig.O., from the Research and Development Division, O.C.Sig.O., to the War Plans and Training Division, O.C.Sig.O., This involved only Mr. William F. Friedman and Mr. James J. Skelly; the latter was discharged soon thereafter, and his position abolished. The next step was to obtain additional personnel for the Signal Intelligence Service. This necessitated much careful study of organization, type of personnel required, the nature of the positions to be filled, restrictions of the Civil Service Act, etc. All of this had to be of the nature of pioneer work in an uncharted field, for there existed no equivalent organizations of this kind anywhere in the government service. Finally, a

carefully planned schedule of positions was drawn up to be used as a guide in obtaining the personnel desired. This schedule, attached hereto as Exhibit A, was submitted to and approved by the Chief Signal Officer. Funds made available by the Military Intelligence Division together with funds already available in the O.C.Sig. O. were sufficient to permit of the immediate creation of six new positions, viz., three Junior Cryptanalysts, one Cryptanalyst Aide, and two Assistant Cryptographic Clerks. Authority to establish these new positions and to fill the vacancies was obtained from the Secretary of War and the matter was then taken up with the Civil Service Commission. After many months of careful study of Civil Service rosters of various kinds, the individuals herein recommended for promotion were selected on account of their apparent character and latent ability. They were given to understand that this office is seeking to establish a permanent corps of trained experts in cryptography and that one who was not disposed to make this work his life work would be engaged.

6. The latter factor deserves special consideration, Cryptographic work is a specialty among certain few restricted governmental activities. Work of this kind, particularly as regards solution activities, is not conducted in business and even in the government service the personnel engaged in cryptographic work is extremely limited. Counting the personnel in the Signal Intelligence Section, there are in the entire government service not more than ten or possibly a dozen persons employed for cryptographic and cryptanalytic studies. The consequences of this peculiar situation are obvious; the longer a person stays in so a restricted field, the more dependent he becomes upon the particular position for which he has qualified and which he occupies. Should the position be abolished, or funds for its continuance become unavailable, all of his training and accomplishments in this work avail him nothing in gaining a livelihood elsewhere, because there is no demand for services of the kind he can perform and because his long years of work in this specialty have not fitted him for other kinds of work. Should no provision be made for promotion consistent with advancement in skill, there is no opportunity to offer his services elsewhere to organizations where they might be more appreciated and better rewarded. It is therefore evident that very restricted activities of this kind impose a moral obligation of those who are responsible for their conduct, to see to it that the young persons they engage for these activities, who demonstrate aptitude for the difficult work, earnestness and sincerity of purposes, and loyalty, should be warranted in adopting a feeling of security of tenure of position and of certainty of substantial recognition of accomplishment on a par with that which they might have obtained in other fields of endeavor where these factors are the basis for advancement.

7. It is believed that the consideration of the necessity for long continued training in this type of work, the unusual combination of high grade intelligence and undoubted character required, places this group of employees in a considerably different category than those normally employed by the Signal Corps. This is apparent when it is realized that practically all other classes of employees may be obtained from the open market, whereas it is essential that the Signal Corps devote several years and much money to the training of specially selected individuals in order to produce qualified cryptographic personnel. This is especially true of those filling the cryptanalyst positions, for they have already devoted many years to professional studies and training and must yet undergo special instruction of several years duration in cryptographic studies. It is therefore my opinion that the new employees would be justified in assuming that the Signal Corps is not living up to its obligations, if an initial increase is not provided in the near future. Furthermore, it would be only logical for them to feel that future recognition of their services would likewise be quite problematical and possibly without results so far as financial advancement is concerned. Since age was an important factor in the selection of these individuals, even after a year or two of training, all of them would still be young enough to profit by a change to some other activity wherein the prospects of advancement might be considerably greater and therefore there would soon come the desire to separate themselves from the Signal Corps, with a consequent loss to the service of all the time and money expended in their training.

8. The training of the newly acquired personnel is progressing rapidly and time will shortly arrive when steps must be taken to furnish strategic corps areas and departments with Signal Intelligence Sections to be composed of two Junior Cryptanalysts and one Cryptographic Clerk. This will require the taking in of an equivalent number of additional employees under the same classifications until such time as the above-mentioned corps areas and departments have been completely supplied. In this connection it may be pointed out that duty in the Signal Intelligence Service will impose the same type of personal restrictions as are imposed upon military personnel, in that they will be expected to perform the duty at stations not subject to their own selections.

9. The foregoing facts are believed to explain the necessity for regular increases in their pay, reasonable in amount and consistent with their progress and length of service, and to the end that no dissatisfaction may be engendered through the failure of the Signal Corps to look properly to their interests.

10. If consistent with the rules of procedure of the Board, it is desired that I be given an opportunity to appear before the Board, in person, with the view to indicating more clearly the peculiar conditions involved in the development and operations of the Signal Intelligence Service.

Dear Colonel Allison:

I regret the delay made necessary due to waiting action by the Treasury Department on Mr. Friedman's active duty period with the Coast Guard. I understand that efficiency reports should normally be prepared within ten days after completion of the active duty period, but I believe the attached photostat copy of a letter just received from the Secretary of the Treasury will be sufficient explanation for the delay.

I would like to point out that Major Friedman was ordered to active duty with the Coast Guard for the purpose of observing the personnel, materiel, and operation concerned in goniometric and radio intercept activities. Major Friedman's efficiency report should therefore be made out with that basic requirement in view. While on this duty for the Signal Corps, he rendered valuable service to the Coast Guard in the nature of instruction. The attached letter indicates its value to the Coast Guard. However, it is my opinion that the degree of efficiency indicated in this letter must be translated on the efficiency report in terms of his value to the Signal Corps in goniometric and radio intercept activities.


MEMORANDUM for Administration Section.

SUBJECT: Permanent Appointment of William F. Friedman as Cryptanalyst.

1. It is requested that the necessary steps be taken so that Mr. Friedman can obtain a permanent Civil Service appointment as Cryptanalyst in the Office of the Chief Signal Officer, Washington, D. C. It is considered from the data given below that it will be possible for Mr. Friedman to be given this appointment at a salary of \$4500.00 per annum under Section 10, Rule II of the Civil Service Rules, which allows appointment in special cases without requiring a competitive examination.
2. By direction of the General Staff, there has been assigned to the Signal Corps the compilation and preparation of all methods for secret correspondence to be used in the Army. For this work the services of a highly trained expert are required. This expert must have had wide experience in the preparation and compilation of codes and ciphers, and in the analysis of such codes and ciphers. The expert required must also be thoroughly competent to perform the following work: to direct instruction and deliver lectures on the proper use of codes and ciphers; to prepare instructions and papers on such subject; to compile special problems for instruction purposes; to examine and pass upon such codes and ciphers systems as are continually being submitted to the Signal Corps for consideration; to thoroughly understand the operation of the printing telegraph cipher, and be competent to direct the traffic of such a system with absolute safety and secrecy.
3. There are no more than two, or possibly three, men in the United States who can be considered expert on all of the above lines of work, and from his work with the Signal Corps, Mr. Friedman has a more intimate knowledge of the Signal Corps needs than any person who could be obtained.
4. Mr. Friedman is a graduate of Cornell University, is thirty years of age, and has been engaged for the past five years in code and cipher work in a professional way. He was a commissioned officer in the Army during the War, and has done some remarkable work in solving several ciphers which were stated to be insoluble by the best experts among the Allies and in this country.

5. It is considered from the very special nature of this work, and from the fact that there are only two or three other qualified men in the country, that Mr. Friedman can be given an appointment under Section 10, Rule II, Civil Service Rules, without a competitive examination, as it is considered that the holding of such an examination would cause unnecessary delay, as the Signal Corps has knowledge of all expert Cryptanalysts, and is positive that Mr. Friedman is better qualified for this work than any other man in the United States.

6. Form No. 375, filled out by Mr. Friedman is forwarded herewith, together with a recommendation from Major Frank Moorman, General Staff, dated October 31, 1921.



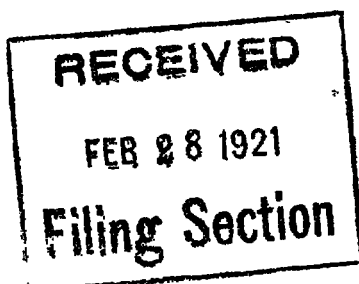

1. Your attention is invited to your memorandum of November 30, 1920, requesting the Supply Division to place an order with Mrs. W. F. Friedman for:

2. It now develops that although your memorandum did not so state, it was your intention and agreement with Mrs. Friedman to pay her in monthly installments for that portion of the work completed during the preceding month. As a statement to this effect was not included in your memorandum, it was not placed in the order; therefore when Mrs. Friedman presented her first voucher for \$150.00, the Disbursing Officer held that the Signal Corps was not contracting for services but was rather contracting with Mrs. Friedman for the actual delivery of four code books, and therefore refused to pay her until the completion of her work. The matter was taken up with the Auditor and in the first conference he informally upheld the Disbursing Officer, but when all the facts were presented to him he decided that if the confidential Staff code and the three Field codes upon which Mrs. Friedman is working were in existence when the order was placed, and if Mrs. Friedman is engaged in reconstruction, revision, bringing up to date, or improving existing codes, the contract actually covers services and the Signal Corps may draw up a supplementary contract providing for periodical payment of services.

- 2 -

3. In this connection your attention is invited to the fact that your memorandum apparently indicates that the Staff code is in existence, but the Field codes are not. Upon taking up this matter with one of your force it develops that there is a possibility that the three Field codes are also in existence, and that Mrs. Friedman may be engaged in reconstruction and revision of them, rather than in the production of a new article. A statement from your division on this point is requested.

4. Referring to a second memorandum from your division, dated November 30, 1920, you are advised that the same statements made in the preceding paragraph concerning the contract placed with Mrs. Friedman also hold concerning the contract placed with Mr. Friedman. It is therefore requested that you furnish the same information concerning the work being done by Mr. Friedman.

5. Your attention is further invited to the fact that since the contracts of Mr. and Mrs. Friedman are identical in wording except for the amounts, if they are held to cover the delivery of completed material rather than special services, the Signal Corps would necessarily require the delivery of ~~six~~ ^{three} Field codes from each Mr. and Mrs. Friedman.

Dear Major Mauborgne:

I beg leave to acknowledge your letters of Nov. 24th and 27th, both of which arrived this morning.

With reference to the one of Nov. 27th, I wired you today as follows:

" Acknowledging letter November twenty seventh. Please prepare contracts for both on straight six months basis, as per letter. Confirmation follows. "

All the questions raised in my letter of Nov. 22nd have been answered satisfactorily. I think the arrangement that I work for six months at \$300. a month, and Mrs. Friedman for a similar period at \$150. a month, with the understanding that if the work is not completed at the end of that time a second contract be made is the better, and I so wired you.

The information with regard to your talk with Major Moorman is gratifying in more than one way, and I thank you both very much. Major Moorman, by the way, is coming to visit Riverbank on Dec. 6th, though with what purpose is not very clear to me. I think Col. Fabyan is of the opinion that he is coming to see what kind of place it is, with a view to effecting some sort of a liaison, but personally I do not think so. Major Moorman said that he is coming to learn something more about code and cipher. I trust that he will appreciate the necessity for withholding from Col. Fabyan any inkling as to what^{is} being contemplated by ourselves, unless I see fit to break the news myself at the time of his visit. If you have any doubt about his appreciation of this necessity-- it is a delicate matter for me to suggest it to him because I have already asked him to regard my letters to him in reference to my application for a commission as strictly confidential--will you be good enough to put him on his guard. The Colonel is almost uncanny ~~as~~ a self-constituted "intelligence agent", and Major Moorman has not had the experience and the facts we both have with the man.

The rest of this letter will deal with the ~~the~~ last paragraph of your letter. It may be that the "old gentleman seems to be smelling a rat", and it would not be an utter surprise, but I am fully convinced that should he really find out our plans before the time is ripe, he would stop at almost nothing to prevent their consummation. I have had one sad experience already and do not want to have another like it if I can avoid it. Certain it is that the greatest mistake we could make now is to ask for his permission. In the first place, I feel under absolutely no obliga-

tions to him-- quite the other way around it seems to me, and as I hope to be able to show you very soon. In the second place, it is necessary to have everything definitely settled before breaking the news to him, otherwise no one can tell what might be the consequences as far as our relations contemplated with the Signal Corps are concerned. He is as powerful as he is ruthless. Of course the storm will be the more terrific on this account but then once that is over the way will be clear. Therefore, I may as well be frank in saying that I will make no move until the contracts have been signed in due form and all arrangements completed. In any case, should a slip-up occur by any chance in our contemplated connection with the Signal Corps, we shall nevertheless sever our relations with Riverbank, so that Col. Fabyan has nothing to gain in any case.

The sooner all arrangements are completed the better, and the happier we shall all be. I await the contracts.

My dear Friedman.

Your confidential letter of 22 November, reached me by special delivery. Your questions with reference to your employment as a civilian are easily answered. They will be referred to serially.

Reference question 1, the Signal Corps will furnish the following:

(a) Working quarters in the Office of the Chief Signal Officer, including necessary equipment and furniture such as desks, filing cases, typewriter and space in a vault for the safe-keeping of all books and papers.

(b) The services of a typist or a stenographer and typist if necessary.

(c) All materials in the way of papers, filing cards and such paraphernalia as may be essential.

(d) A sample of each type of code to be constructed as per specifications furnished. In the case of the Staff Code, the situation which exists is that a complete manuscript of the Staff Code has been prepared by Major Barnes. All that will be necessary is to re-arrange the phrases according to a hit or miss system so that the labor on this code is not nearly so much as you may expect. The code in its final form will consist of two parts, the enciphering section and the deciphering section. The other Field Codes are, if based on the preceding models, very simple affairs, although due consideration must be given to the introduction of certain new phrases which have been found necessary as the result of experience.

With reference to your question 2, we have need at the present time for three Field Codes and a contract will cover exactly that number. The type of the code is similar to the Field Codes Numbered 1, 2, and 3, employed in France. I regret that I am not able to send you a sample, but as you perhaps remember, they

are very simple codes, consisting of about 2000 words and phrases.

With reference to paragraph 3, that is, "if the work is finished before six months, will it be considered that my part of the contract will have been completed?", would state that with Mr. Barnes the arrangement was that he would be paid so much for the job, divided into equal monthly payments. We believe that it will be six months at least, hence the price of the job was accordingly so settled. However, once the contract is made according to the terms "so much for the job", we have no right to hold you for any period of time, the contract simply stating "for services in the construction, etc., for the job" so much. Hence when the job is finished, be it in one month or six, the lump sum should be paid. If the work is not finished within six months, by the same arrangement, you would not receive any more money than the total amount specified for the job. Hence, the gentleman's agreement which was made between the Signal Corps and Mr. Barnes seems to be the best possible one, namely, that you work for a period of six months at what amount^s to a monthly salary and complete the job in exactly six months, or, on the part of the Signal Corps, in case the work is not complete, an additional contract can be made with you, as was made in the case of Mr. Barnes, on the continuation of the job at the same rate of pay. This arrangement assures you a monthly income of \$300.00 a month.

I am rather anxious to know how you look on this proposition, first, as to whether you want it stated that you will work for six months at \$300 a month, and if the codes are not completed due to changes in them which may be introduced by the Signal Corps, that another contract be made with you for another period of six months, or if you prefer to take the proposition at its face value and complete the job in a shorter or longer time than six months, carrying the job to completion, which includes the proper reading of the proof, and the time necessary for it to get in the hands of the public printer, in which there might be some delay. That is a difficulty over which the Signal Corps has no control, and depends upon the amount of work in the Government Printing Office. However, if your six months work took you up to the point where the manuscript was ready for the printer and he spent a month or more getting it into shape, it would be quite probable to do one of two things, either take you on for a period while the printing was going on and give you some small work such as the preparation of another small code or something of the sort while you were waiting for your proof, or let you go and make another contract with you when the proof was ready, depending upon how you felt about it.

Yesterday I had a talk with Moorman about your employment, and he promised me that in case the Signal Corps

ran out of work in your line, he would be very glad, if you were willing, to make a place for you and take care of you and Mrs. Friedman, if the Signal Corps could not. However, Colonel Curtis, our Executive Officer here, is of the opinion that there will be plenty of work for you to do with the Signal Corps if you want to make contract after contract on this basis.

With reference to your question 4, there would be no objection if you so desired for you to work in the office evenings and Sundays. Also if you so wished, you might take part of the work home, if you were quite sure of having the manuscript under lock and key.

Your question 5 I have answered before, that is with reference to the delay in the printing of the manuscript.

With reference to paragraph 6, a definite and formal contract for Mrs. Friedman's services can be sent at the same time as that of your services. I have secured the permission of the Executive Officer to engage the services of Mrs. Friedman in this manner.

With reference to your final paragraph, I should like to commence the work as soon as possible after the signing of the contract. You will appreciate the fact that this letter is highly confidential and that it is not in the nature of a formal agreement or a contract between the Government and yourself, and that nothing I have said binds the Government officially. This is a gentleman's agreement and you will find that it can be carried out to the letter although none of this correspondence appears in the official files. The point is, Friedman, that we need your services with the Government and that we would like to have them for a continuing period of time regardless of what kind of a job we call it or what the work is that has to be done, so long as it has to do with codes and ciphers. We feel that it would be a great misfortune if the Friedman family were to retire to some other kind of a job than code and cipher work and hope to make an arrangement which is agreeable to both you and ourselves.

The only fly in the ointment now seems to be the fact that the old gentleman seems to be smelling a rat and he wrote me a very peculiar letter, very much about nothing in an attempt to get me to say something, very likely about your future. I said nothing in my letter about you. This may, perhaps, have been a

mistake, because I am pretty sure that he is going to feel very much hurt because I have not asked his permission before requesting you to take a job with the Government, or to do work for the Government in the nature of a job. However, I think that this is a matter which you can best decide. If you decide to bring the matter to his attention yourself and think that I had better not say anything about it, so be it. I expect to have a tower of wrath descend upon me in any case. On the other hand, if you think that I had better say something about it prior to actually sending you a contract, let me know about it as soon as possible. In any case I shall be glad to have you let me know what you wish to do at a very early date, for it takes a few days to get an order through and a contract made out, etc.

My dear Friedman:

The Chief Signal Officer heard yesterday from his very insistent letter about your case. It was returned from the Adjutant General's Office with the information that the second report of the doctors on the board had confirmed the findings of the first and that you were physically disqualified for service on account of the condition of your heart.

I do not know whether this is a more severe blow to you that it is to the Signal Corps. The entire board of review, together with the Chief Signal Officer, was unanimous in recommending that everything possible be done to get you into the service, but there is now no hope. I cannot tell you how sorry I feel about this personally, but I do hope that we can be able to make some sort of an arrangement with you as a civilian to do our code compilation work. I suppose that an answer to my letter of the other day will cross this one on the way, with reference to your employment as a civilian.

Your letter of November the eighteenth, was very enlightening as it gave me a little different idea about what the situation was out your way. I hope you will feel entirely free to discuss my proposed arrangements about your civilian employment, and will speak frankly.

Dear Major Mauborgne:

Replying to your confidential letter of Nov. 19th, the information with regard to the action taken by the Board of Review is very interesting but I have little hope of anything coming from it. As I see it, the papers constituting the supplementary report from the Local Personnel Board made no change in my case at Washington. Nevertheless, I thank you.

Now with regard to the details of civilian employment as outlined in your letter, the offer is interesting enough to warrant my careful consideration and before giving a definite answer I would like information on the following points, some of which are, of course, of minor importance, but will have some bearing upon the situation.

1. Will the Signal Corps furnish the following:
 - a) Working quarters, including the necessary equipment and furniture, such as desks, filing cases, typewriter, etc., also a vault for safekeeping of all books and papers.
 - b) Services of a typist. This, I suppose, would not necessarily include the full time of the operator.
 - c) Materials in the way of paper, filing cards, and such paraphernalia as would be essential in work of this nature.
 - d) A sample of each type of code to be constructed as per specifications furnished.
2. I note that at one place in your letter you say "... as well as the preparation of two or three field codes", and in the quotation of the proposition as made to Mr. Barnes, it says "... and the construction of three field codes". Will you please indicate the exact number and type of the codes to be covered by the contract?
3. If the work is finished before six months, will it be considered that my part of the contract will have been completed? And if the work is not finished within six months, will the completion be at my own expense?
4. If quarters are to be furnished in a government building, will it be possible for me to work evenings and Sundays, or will the working hours be limited to government hours?
5. If a delay outside my control is occasioned in the printing of the manuscripts, and a considerable period of time will be necessary before the proofs are forthcoming, will such delay be chargeable to my time and my account? If such a delay

should exceed one month, would I be free to go about my business until the proofs are forthcoming? This question may seem a bit far-fetched to you, but I have had some unpleasant experiences due to delay and strikes and so on in private printing offices. I suppose, however, that the case is much different in the government printing office.

6. Finally, I want to ask whether a definite and formal contract for Mrs. Friedman's services can be sent at the same time as that for my services? Her aid in this work would be a very great advantage not only to me but more so to the government on account of her previous experience and ability in cryptography.

Will you please also indicate how soon you would want the work to commence after the signing of the contracts? I may add in confidence that my past experience with my present employer and the experience of others of whom I have knowledge, makes it very advisable to have a definite contract signed before acquainting him of my intentions.

I hope to hear from you very shortly.

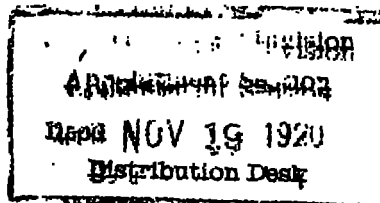

My dear Friedman:

This letter is highly confidential.

Your case came before the Board of Review of which I am a member and it appeared that you had been turned down physically by the Board upon first examination and that the Surgeon General had concurred. The entire Board recognized the value you would be to the service, and have taken the letter you wrote me stating what happened at your examination and how you were examined the second time and passed physically, and have prepared a letter for the signature of the Chief Signal Officer requesting a reconsideration of the papers in your case, and inviting attention to the fact that the Board was not allowed to pass upon the case, which was settled solely upon the physical examination, so that now I do not know what the outcome will be.

At any rate, there is no reason why we should not at once consider your employment as a civilian in connection with the revision of the confidential staff code, as well as for the preparation of two or three field codes which are needed without delay by the Signal Corps. Barnes, who did the first work on the staff code, is apparently tied up with another company until next March and the Signal Corps cannot afford to wait that long to have Mr. Barnes do any work in the way of further revision of the staff code. I want to see how you feel about the same kind of a proposition as we made Mr. Barnes, namely, the Signal Corps places an order with him as a code expert for "services in connection with the reconstruction and revision of a confidential staff code and the construction of three field codes, constructed in accordance with general specifications communicated confidentially by the Chief of the Engineering and Research Division, under the following provisions: Preparation of the manuscript for the code; and all necessary proof reading after the manuscript has been set up in type - For the job.....\$1800.00".

This is the way the order reads, and what actually happens is that we can certify each month, as we did in the case of Mr. Barnes, that a certain amount of work has been done, which warrants the payment to you of about \$300 a month. I appreciate the fact that this is less than you are getting, but the situation at present is that I cannot hire you at a salary greater than that which we paid Mr. Barnes.

I trust that this arrangement may meet with your desires and that you will advise me that you are ready to accept a contract of this sort as soon as possible.

It is also quite possible that we might engage Mrs Friedman's services as an assistant, since it is practically impossible for a lone individual to do this work. Mrs Friedman's salary in this case could probably not be made more than \$150 a month, or rather a contract might be made with her to do a certain job for a lump sum of \$900 for the job, and we can arrange to make monthly payments.

Let me hear from you about this matter as early as possible so that I may know how you feel about the matter.

I wired you today as follows:

"Acknowledging letter November fifteenth, temporary civilian situation interests me. Please write particulars."

I await your reply with interest.

In reference to your letter. I could tell you more things about that local examining board that would further interest you, but shall refrain until a more favorable opportunity.

Two days ago I received a formal, mimeographed notification from the A. G. O's office, dated Nov. 11th, to the effect that I had not been selected for appointment, but stating no reasons therefor. In view of your letter, I am certain that either my papers have been lost or that they have been shunted from the Board of Review of which you are a member. However, it may also be that this notification is due to the following circumstances:

You will recall that the Medical Board turned me down at first, and that the Local Personnel Board immediately forwarded my papers to Washington. It may be that this notification is simply a routine result of the first report. After the second Medical Examination, the Board forwarded (or said it would) a supplementary report, which may be slower than usual in going through channels, or may be lost, or may not have gone through your board. In any case I would like to know what happened and would appreciate information on the subject if you can trace the matter.

There is, however, a bit of information which, while it can have no effect upon my case now, I do want you to know. It is this: In October, 1917, The M.I.D. offered, in writing, to commission me and send me over in charge of the bunch. This letter (photostat copy of which I have) and its contents were withheld from me and not until February, 1919, did I learn of the matter. Had I known at the time, I surely would have accepted and just as surely would have come back a major, barring accidents. As it was, only after my threat of enlisting as a private in March, 1918, were serious attempts made by my employer to get me a commission. As a first lieutenant, going over after most of the men has already established themselves, and being in for only five months before the Armistice, there was no chance for a promotion, especially in the MID where they were very slow in coming.

However, I realize that there is no chance in view of what you say, of a captaincy, and I certainly cannot accept anything less. Of course, in some respects I regret, as much as you do, the way it has turned out, but frankly, I did not bank a great deal upon it. I note that you think I have already left Riverbank, and I suppose you gathered this impression from my requests regarding addressing my mail. However, I have not yet severed my connection with the place, and indeed, I am sure that Colonel Fabyan has no idea of my decision as yet. This is why I requested, and still ask, that you keep my correspondence in confidence until the smoke blows away-- and I assure you there will be a deal of it when the time comes.

I certainly thank you for your assurances of regrets and for your warm interest in me, but I do not want you to feel that in asking me to enter application for commission the result has turned out unfortunately for me, or that it caused a great upheaval in my life, for such was not the case. I had no intention of staying here the rest of my life.

I await your letter in answer to my telegram, and while I certainly appreciate the pressure at which you are always working, I would appreciate a reply at your very earliest convenience.

My dear Friedman:

I have received several letters from you, the last under date of November the first, but I have been so pressed by work that I have not had an opportunity to send you any answer until now.

The story of what happened to you before the Examining Board is very interesting. I am a member of the Board of Review of the Signal Corps and I have a strong temptation to show your letter to the Board when it receives your case. It seems to have taken quite a time to travel from Camp Grant to Washington, as we have not yet received the papers. It is too bad that the Personal Board's decision was that you had to take the examination in Electricity. Other Boards, I am satisfied, would have been more lenient, particularly when a man has had a physics course which always includes the subject of electricity and magnetism.

However, the more important thing to me seems to be the fact that the highest board in session is sticking to the old rule that a man cannot be granted a commission in a grade higher than that which he held during his emergency service. This is most unfortunate, because I am afraid that it is going to mean that you cannot see your way clear to coming in in the only grade that can be given you. I have seen several cases recently in which the inferior boards, including the Board of Review, have recommended a man for a grade higher than that he held during the war, and it invariably was turned down by General Pershing's Board, so I am absolutely helpless in the matter of changing their decision.

I do not know what trouble has been brewing at Riverbank, and why you left, and it is not my purpose to find out, but it appears to me that Colonel Fabyan has missed one bet when he thought that we were going to commission you and send you to Riverbank. There never has been any such idea in the head of anyone in this office. We certainly have enough work for you to do in the Army without detailing you to some "grand and glorious" laboratory, even though that laboratory may be doing work for the Government, so you may

set your mind at rest on that score.

I hope you will keep in touch with me, Friedman, because there may come a time when I can put some work in your way. As a matter of fact, so far as the Code Compilation Section is concerned, it appears that the idea has fallen through from one cause or another. Barnes at the last minute declined to take the examination because he apparently was tied up on the outside, and all others, for one reason or another, declined to take the examination, except yourself, and now that you are falling out, I am without a Code Compilation Section, and it becomes necessary to hire civilians to do this work. I do not know whether your plans would warrant you in coming to Washington to do any work of this kind as a civilian on a temporary basis, or not.

I am sorry if our asking you to take the examination for a commission has resulted in a huge upheaval which has entirely changed your life. This would be most unfortunate, particularly because it looks as though the Army were going to loose your services through a kink in board instructions.

Dear Colonel Mauborgne:

You may be interested to know the details of my local examination and I shall give you a brief summary.

I reported to Examining Board No.60, Camp Grant, at nine o'clock last Monday. At four o'clock the Board called me. They exempted me from the general educational examination but decided that I would have to take the examination in elementary electricity and magnetism; this, despite the fact that my High School certificate shows a full year's course in Physics, and my College certificate, three half year courses in Physics. I felt sure that the Board would exempt me on the strength of those credits and so did not prepare in advance. I acquiesced, naturally, to the Board's decision. I was then directed to report the next morning to the Medical Examining Board, which I did.

The latter board disqualified me on account of what they called an organic heart disease. This was a great shock to me, for in no previous physical examinations in the past three years had any question ever been raised about my heart, and I have never given any symptoms of defective heart action.

I reported back to Board 60, on Wednesday morning and was at once informed that I could not proceed with the examination, having been disqualified physically. I felt very badly about it but there seemed to be nothing I could do then, except write a formal letter stating my case and asking for reconsideration by a superior board.

I returned to Geneva at once, and had myself carefully examined by two local physicians, who pronounced me sound and decided that I had no organic disease of the heart and gave me a certificate to this effect.

After carefully thinking the matter over, I decided to return to the Medical Board at Camp Grant and request a reexamination. This, I found them willing to do, and after some slight apology in which they stated that no man could expect to get an absolutely thorough examination when so many examinations had to be made, and that the government was always given the benefit of the doubt, and that my case could not be determined absolutely at the time of my first examination, so they decided to disqualify me. However after a second, more thorough examination, they decided to pass me and the examining board was notified to that effect.

The President of the board, Colonel Burgess, informed me that my papers had already been forwarded, but that they could and would make a supplementary report.

I was then given the examination in electricity. It consisted of two parts, three questions each. The first part, on Direct Current, I passed, according to my belief; the second part, on Alternating Current, I do not think I passed. It was a surprise to me, as I had no idea that such things as resonance, inductance, reactance and so on belonged to the realm of elementary electricity, and furthermore never had very much along those lines. However, if the board is lenient, they might pass me, though I

doubt it.

The board exempted me entirely from the professional examination in code and cipher, on the strength of my letters.

I then returned to Geneva and am now awaiting the decision of the final board.

You may be interested to know that I applied for a majority and stated that I would not consider a grade below captain. You know, I think, that my present position is more than equal, financially, to that of a major, and I do not see how I could possibly consider anything less than a captaincy, and I certainly feel that my experience and ability deserve that much recognition from the government, if the Signal Corps really wants me. I hope that the Chief Signal Officer and you will consider my application in a favorable light.

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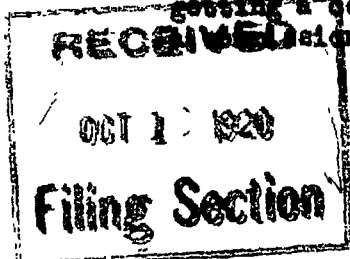
My dear Friedman:

Acknowledge receipt of your letter of the 12th, which arrived during my absence in Philadelphia. I note carefully what you have said about the very question which I knew would bob up, and that is the matter of your rank, in case you pass the examination for commission. I do know this, that in no case will any former officer be given a higher commission than the highest rank he has held in the service. I do believe however, that any board of officers would give you the rank you formerly held, which, I believe, was that of first lieutenant.

With reference to the examination, I believe that you will find that the greater part of the questions are about a knowledge of code compilation, the cipher side being not dwelt upon with any great force, and being, as a matter of fact, placed in sort of "second fiddle" position because of our need for officers for code compilation work. We have the job of constructing three or four codes right at present and have nobody to do the work. This, as you know, means that the man who compiles them has to be fully aware of the "rocks" he must avoid in the compilation of such a code. Later it is planned to construct code and cipher courses suitable for instruction for Signal Corps personnel.

Now between us, I believe that should you get into the service as a Signal Corps officer, that there might be some effort made on the part of the military intelligence to take you away from the Signal Corps in order to work on the General Staff in connection with their code and cipher section. This is a wild guess on my part, and this contemplated action is not the reason for our writing and asking you to come and join the Signal Corps, because the Office of the Chief Signal Officer recognizes your abilities and would like to have you for the Signal Corps work outlined. I simply point the other thing out as a possibility which, of course, could be staved off if you do not want it, by protest of the Chief Signal Officer himself. On the other hand if you, at some later time, felt inclined to look for such a position, his assistance would be decidedly valuable should he feel that the demands of the service at large were such as to warrant him in giving you up to the General Staff. That, however, is a minor matter, depending upon your getting a commission, and depending upon whether or not you care to take a decision with the grade you held.

I appreciate your situation fully in the matter, and do

not care to be placed in the position of trying to influence you one way or another. Similarly, the Signal Corps cannot feel hurt if you cannot see your way to living in the Army if you cannot make both ends meet on the commission which might be given you.

Dear Major Mauborgne:

I beg leave to acknowledge your letter of October 7th, also of October 9th, enclosing your letter of recommendation.

You have been generous, indeed, in your commendation, and leave me wondering if I deserve such praise, though I admit I have probably spent more deep thought on the subject of cryptography than all but a very few others, if any. At any rate, I certainly thank you very much.

I have written to two other officers for letters and shall try to pass the examination. At present I am wondering what kind of an examination given in one-half a day, or a day, or a whole week, can cover the range of experience and analytical powers a real cryptographer should have. You, more than almost anyone else, realize the nature of the work, and how slowly it goes.

However, your letter anticipates my passing the examination and possibly being ordered to Washington to report to you. I assure you the association would certainly be appreciated very highly, and that I would give my best efforts, but the eternal question of the H.C.L. confronts one, and in justice to Mrs. Friedman, to say nothing about myself or my future, and regardless of any personal ambitions I may have to leave some worthy record of my attainments, I must consider the future. If Uncle Sam makes me a proposition that is more satisfactory than the one I have, all things considered, I will talk it over with Mrs. Friedman, and consider it most carefully. But I wish to say that I am not looking for a job and that had you not written me, it would not even have occurred to me to enter the application. In your letter you stated frankly that the Department could not commit itself to anything, and I presume you understood that in filling out the formal blank I was not committing myself to take anything the Department might offer.

Please do not think that I am attempting a back exit, or have had a change in heart. I merely want you to have a clear understanding in return for the interest you have shown.

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My dear Friedman:

A situation has recently arisen in which you may be interested. The Signal Corps, among the other branches of the service, recently had examinations for commissioned officers which were open to all those who had been commissioned during the war. In the original examinations there was no professional examination for code and cipher people, who are really specialists. The Signal Corps must continue its function of running a Code Compilation Section, and we are in the market for officers to handle that kind of a job. Your name naturally came up when the question arose as to whom to send application blanks. The question now before the house is, do you want to take an examination before the local board in Chicago to become a Signal Corps officer to do work in connection with the Code Compilation Section which is proposed? No guarantee can be given, of course, that you will be commissioned because the matter of an examining board stands between you and the Signal Corps.

However, inasmuch as you are not familiar with the examinations, I shall tell you briefly about them. Applications must be made to the Adjutant General of the Army so as to reach the Adjutant General not later than October 9th. Application blank and the circular letter on this subject are enclosed. The examination for Signal Corps officers consists of

First: Physical examination, which is thorough.

Second: A mental examination which comprises Parts (a) and (b), as described in this memorandum of the War Department, dated May 29th, which I am enclosing.

The only thing the blank does not show is the fact that under Part (b), the professional examination for Signal Corps officers

is to consist of the following:

- (a) Elementary electricity and magnetism.
- (b) One of the following elective subjects:
 - (1). Radio telegraphy and telephony.
 - (2). Meteorology.
 - (3). Telephone and telegraph engineering.
 - (4). Procurement, inspection, purchase and storage and maintenance of Signal Corps supplies.,

and finally the paragraph which has just been added, which permits of an examination in Codes and Ciphers, the principle part of it being particularly "code compilation."

In your case, Part (a) would be waived if you can produce from your various schools and colleges, certificates showing that you have successfully taken a course, and have successfully passed an examination in the elementary subjects outlined under (a), and if, in addition, you have taken at any High School or college, elementary electricity and magnetism, you should present evidence which should entitle you to be exempted from electricity under Part (b). The only remaining thing for you to take a written examination in would be codes and ciphers as part of the examination.

I think that there is no doubt but that you could pass such an examination, and I suggest that if you are interested, you hustle back this application blank to the Adjutant General, without delay, making application to take the examination. I think that in addition to the blank it would be well to state your particular qualifications for Code Compilation as well as Code and Cipher breaking.

I hope that Colonel Fabyan won't think that I am trying to take you away from his service, and of course, the proposition may not appeal to you at all, particularly since Mrs Friedman is to be considered. Should you pass this examination, and be commissioned, we naturally would want you to come to Washington to take part in this Code Compilation work. The matter is right up to you, and I suggest that you consider it carefully and then let me know whether you do or do not want to take the examination, which, in your case, will undoubtedly, be held in Chicago.
