"Events in the Daily Life of a Cryptanalyst". By Major William F. Friedman, Sig.-Res., of Washington, D.C. The talk will be illustrated with lantern slides and several interesting exhibits.

Major Friedman is Chief of the Code and Cipher Section in the Office of the Chief Signal Officer, War Department, where he is in charge of the compilation of all codes and ciphers employed by the Army. He has probably had more practical experience in the little-known field of cryptography than any other person in the United States. In 1916, while in charge of the Department of Genetics at the Riverbank Laboratories, Geneva, Illinois, he became interested in the subject as a hobby. Largely through his own initiative he mastered what little information was available, and presently he began making original contributions to the field. Soon the imminence of our entry into the World War led the government to ask for his services, as a result of which he became the director of a school in which many of our officers assigned to decoding enemy documents were trained. Later he was commissioned and sent to American G.H.Q. as a member of the Radio Intelligence section of the General Staff. After the war his services were considered valuable enough to lead the War Department to ask that he continue his work with the Signal Corps, where he is often called upon by other government departments and sometimes, as in the case of the Oil Investigation, by the Senate - in his expert capacity.
