Dear Boris:

One of the pleasant things that happened to me just before I left London for my return to the United States was the receipt of your very nice letter of August 26. It took a considerable amount of time to get to me because I was not in London perhaps when the letter arrived, or it is possible that it took a long time for the letter to get from Sweden to London. At any rate it came a little too late for me to be able to accept your most courteous invitation to visit you at Sundsvor. There is nothing I would have liked better, but the situation required that I get back to Washington and I could not spare the time. Nevertheless, some day Elizebeth and I will indeed come to visit the Hagelins, and we are looking forward to the happy reunion that would naturally follow.

I notified Colonel Cook of what you had to say in your letter with regard to some supplementary information that you might have on German communication systems, and it is possible that he may get in touch with you.

I had a rather long, but not too tedious, air trip coming back and I am feeling quite well. Now that the war is over, I am hoping to be able to find a little more time and leisure for my own things, principally golf which I am beginning to realize is an important part of my method of keeping well. Sometimes I enjoy it very much, and sometimes it is nothing but an aggravation, but in any case I know that the fresh air and exercise are good for me and I feel a lot better when I play two or three times a week.

Barbara has gone back to Radcliffe to finish up. John is still in Mississippi, and the two of us are leading a very quiet life in the old home.

Thank you very much again for your nice letter, and if travel becomes soon possible again maybe Elizebeth and I will come to visit you. With very best regards to all of you, I am
